Mayor Frink said that Market Square was a public place and in that way different from a street. Regarding the other streets he felt that more consideration should be given to the local improvement act should be secured before abandoning the improvements.

Com. McLellan said that the act provided for the local improvement act should be charged only with the width of half an average street, and as they profited by the pavement he thought they should contribute.

Com. Potts moved that the plans for the Market Square pavements be approved, the tenders be called for the work at an estimated cost of \$26,442, and that payment be made by debenture issue.

Commissioner Russell seconded the motion.

Com. McLellan said that if this established a precedent for the holding of the local improvement act he could not support the motion.

Com. Wigmore said that he thought the final payment was up to the assessors.

Com. Potts said that if this was not adopted it was the last recommendation for pavements he would bring in, unless petitions were presented under the improvement act and if they waited for that they would wait a long time.

Com. McLellan said he was not opposed to paving Market Square, but he wanted a day or two to consider its effect on the improvement act.

The motion was put, and as it required an unanimous vote and Com. McLellan opposed it, the motion was declared lost.
