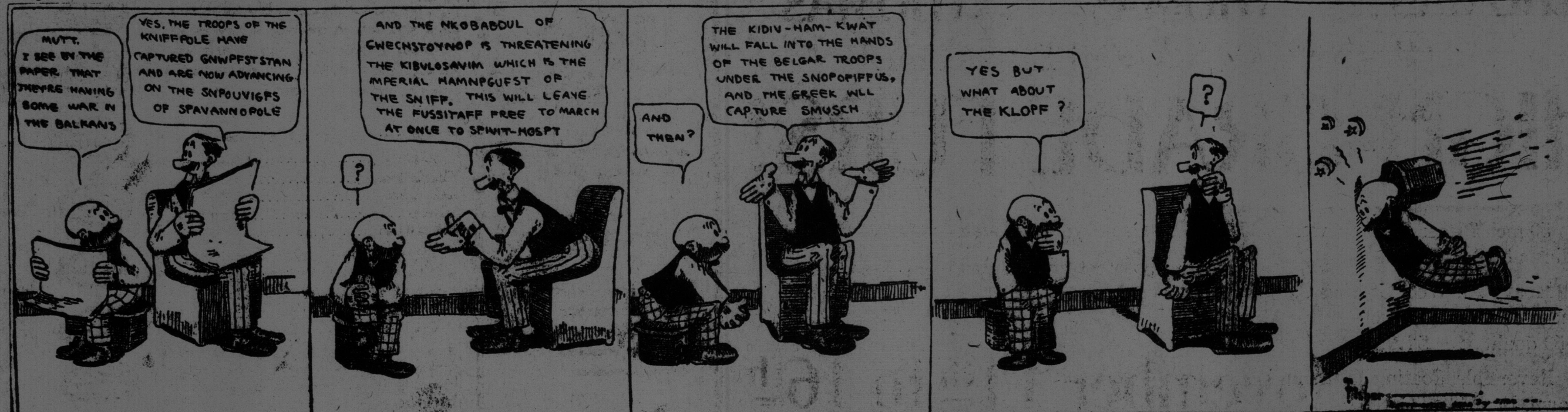

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 7.—(Special)—A boxing bout to have gone fifteen rounds, came off in Halifax tonight between Tom Foley of this city, and Kid O'Neill, of Glace Bay. At the end of the tenth round Foley, who had been weakening since the fifth round, was counted out.

Johnson Arrested.

Jack Johnson, heavy weight prize-fighter, is now at liberty in Chicago under bonds of \$50,000. He was arrested last night on a charge of violating the Mann white slave act, it being said against him that he brought Belle Schieber, of Pittsburgh, a white woman, aged twenty-six years, to Chicago, for immoral purposes. He cried when the handcuffs were being placed upon him by the police. Bell was freed a few hours after her arrest. Lucille Cameron, the other girl in the case, is held in \$15,000 bail as a witness.

Why English Men Lose.

A brand new explanation, but not a bad one, of the decline in the prowess of British boxing is offered by Boxing, a London weekly and the only paper in the world devoted exclusively to fighting. Boxing says the English custom, of having bouts of two-minute rounds has induced laziness in training and encouraged dirty tactics in the ring.

The result is that when the English scrappers go against French and Americans who are trained for the three-minute rounds, they either do not force the issue as they should, or become weary earlier than their exertions justify.

Athletic

"Strongest Man" Dying.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—Louis Cyr, "the strongest man in the world," is dying at the residence of his son-in-law, Dr. Aymont, this city.

Louis Cyr, born in St. Cyr, Quebec, is now 49 years old. He started his career in 1882 and in 1891 the millionaire sportsman, Richard Fox, took him under management and produced him in all the European capitals. In London Cyr established an unequalled record by lifting with his shoulders a platform bearing a weight of 3,655 pounds. In 1893 Cyr beat his own record in Boston by lifting a platform carrying eighteen men, weighing in all 4,300 pounds. Cyr retired in 1904 after having given exhibitions all over America.

Lexington, Nov. 6.—Airdale, 2:15 1-4, world's champion trotting yearling, was sold by his breeder and owner, J. L. Taylor, proprietor of the Airdale Farm, near this city, to J. Howard Ford, owner of Stony Ford Farm, for the record-breaking price of \$12,500.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—It is probable the first player to be signed by Johnny Evers, new manager of the Cubs, will be Eddie McDonald, former third baseman of the Boston Nationals, who was released to Sacramento of the Coast League. Evers says he has opened correspondence with the latter club to obtain his release and also has written to McDonald at his Albany, N. Y. home. He considers McDonald a star.

Philadelphia, Nov. 7.—"I haven't put in a claim for Roger Bresnahan or Hank Chance," said Charlie Doina, manager of the Phillies and furthermore I shall not. I do not think that Chance ever will play again and therefore he would be of no use to us. Bresnahan would be of little use either unless he went through a rigid training course. I would like to have another first class catcher and the Bresnahan of past days would be received with open arms by me, but I think Roger of the present day will not do the mark again."

Bresnahan has taken on so much extra weight during the time he has been manager at St. Louis that he is far from being the great catcher today that he was when he first joined the Cardinals. Despite all the talk that is going about it is not likely that Chance or Bresnahan ever will play again. They may make desirable manna for some club, and there are several National League clubs that could use them.

FORTUNE IN TEMPLE COFFERS

Great Masses of Small Coins From Japanese Offerory Chests

Among the many oddities in Japan which are enormously big in the outward form but are in reality exceedingly small we must count the Kwannon of Asagawa, which is scarcely three inches in height and yet is housed in a colossal edifice known as the Kwannon Temple.

On the other hand, there are not a few things which at first sight appear extremely small and insignificant and which in truth assume gigantic dimensions. To this latter category belongs the sales (offerings) daily, hourly, nay, every minute, unceasingly thrown into the offerory chests before the same Kwannon Temple of Asagawa. The Nishi Nishi, an interesting paragraph concerning the receipts of the Kwannon Temple accruing from the sales of offerory boxes placed at various places within the temple compound. The following is the latest information upon the subject.

At certain stated days all the coffers are emptied under the joint supervision of four responsible priests, and mountains of coins of various descriptions are piled up. One-half of these coins are five rice coppers, while 40 per cent of the whole are sen coins, the remainder being nikkei, small silver and old-fashioned rice coins.

Every ten days these heterogeneous masses of small coins are exchanged into convenient and uniform currency checks. Two money changers named Yamada and Hayakawa are regularly entrusted with this system. The receipts vary according to various seasons, and in the festive season or the flower season, such as the present, no less than 100 yen are obtained every ten days. Even when the season is unfavorable the receipts will not go below 70 or 80 yen, and the average monthly income from the twenty offerory coffers amounts to 4,000 yen.

The money of exchange is somewhat unique. It is not conducted on the commission basis usually adopted. The coins are exchanged, not at valorem, but specifically, so to say. All the coins are jumbled out upon large scales and weighed, and the exchangers take from all indiscriminately by weight, paying three yen for every kwan of the heterogeneous coins.

The regular monthly takings of 4,000 yen for the offerory chests alone is certainly a good income, but we are reminded at the same time that the expenditures defrayed by the temple authorities regularly is by no means inconsiderable. When we are told that for the repairs of the temple building alone an outlay of from 4,000 yen to 10,000 yen is required per annum we can form some idea of the expenses in other sections.—Japan Advertiser.
