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HERriot HOLDS MAJORITY IN CHAMBER

SOCIALISTS TO SUPPORT NOTHER PREMIER

Stand For Herriot, 104 Strong, at Meeting Today

PAINLEVE TALKS of Anxious to Form Cabinet But Willing to Make Sacrifice

PARIS, April 11.—The Herriot cabinet is out of power, overthrown by the Senate because of the charges against M. Herriot's rule, the legal limit of the bank note circulation has been secretly exceeded, but M. Herriot's majority in the Chamber of Deputies remains virtually intact.

SOCIALISTS SOLID. The Socialists, 104 strong, voted even one better when they decided they would support no other than M. Herriot.

PAINLEVE LIKELY. M. Painleve, president of the chamber, who announced that he would not accept the task of forming a cabinet when it was first mentioned, but "would sacrifice himself to the cause of the Left," should no other politicians be found able to reconcile the widely divergent viewpoints of the Senate and Chamber, appears to be the man most likely to succeed in forming a ministry.

AMUNDSEN STARTS FOR ARCTIC LAND Will Make Spitzbergen Base For Pole Flight—Flying Boats Ready For Voyage.

OSLO, Norway, April 11.—Roald Amundsen, explorer, who is shortly to make an attempt to fly to the North Pole, left Tromsø yesterday for Spitzbergen, which is to be the base from which the flight will start.

Government Aid. Amundsen will be extensively aided in his flight by the Norwegian Government, which has established a meteorological station at Spitzbergen in order to keep him in touch with weather forecasts. His equipment is excellent.

VESSEL IS LOCATED Science Ship Responds to Radio Calls After Five Days Effort.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Word from the steamer Arcturion, which for five days has failed to answer wireless calls, has been received by the naval commandant at Balboa, Panama Canal zone. The location of the ship, which has aboard a party of scientists on a deep-sea oceanographic expedition, was not given in the message. The names of two vessels which relayed the Arcturion's message to Balboa also were lacking.

NEW VICE-PRESIDENT C. D. Dickson, Sackville, Appointed For N. B. Teachers' Association.

Once a Foundling, Girl Now Is One of Richest Children in U.S.

MINNEOLA, N. Y., April 11.—Joy Louise Leeds, 12 years ago a foundling and one of the earth's disinherited, is today one of the country's wealthiest children. Warner M. Leeds, who made a fortune in tin plate production, and who, childless, had adopted Joy Louise, 12 years ago, when she was a year old, left her the bulk of his estate, estimated at more than \$4,000,000. Two years ago the child was left the \$4,000,000 estate of her foster mother, Mrs. Louise Hartshorn Leeds, who was killed in a plunge from a window of her home. The foster father died two weeks ago.

PLANT IS SEIZED

Soviet Appropriates Westinghouse Property to Satisfy Government Claim.

YAROSTAV, April 11.—The large plant of the Westinghouse Albraks Company which was moved from Leningrad to Yaroslavl in 1919, has been appropriated by the Soviet state monopoly to satisfy the Government's claim against the company for 800,000 rubles. The plant was appropriated by Government experts at 815,000 rubles and offered at public auction but as there were no buyers, the Government took it over for operation by the state metal industry.

LEWIS AT SYDNEY

U. M. W. President Continues Silence on Arrival at N. S. Mine Centre.

SYDNEY, N. S., April 11.—Maintaining the same silence that had characterized his attitude toward inquirers from the time his presence in Halifax was discovered yesterday, John Lewis, International president of the U. M. W. of A., upon whose action depends in a great measure the outcome of the labor struggle that has paralyzed the coal mines in Nova Scotia controlled by the British Empire Steel Corporation, arrived here this morning, almost unheralded, and took up the business of studying the situation at first hand.

MINE IS ABANDONED

MYSTERY SURROUNDS LONDON GIRL'S DEATH

Sixteen-Year-Old Dancing Teacher, Was Found With Throat Cut on Steps of Mother's Home—Unknown Man Held.

LONDON, April 11.—The Scotland Yard authorities are detaining an unmarried man in connection with the death yesterday of Grace Blakair, a pretty 16-year-old dancing teacher, who was found with her throat cut Thursday night on the steps of her mother's home in West Kensington.

IS CHARGED WITH MURDER OF HIS WIFE

Nova Scotia Veteran, Held by Court For Wife's Disappearance.

HALIFAX, April 11.—Duncan Cameron, young Nova Scotia war veteran, who has been held by police for several weeks, while the authorities probed the mystery of his wife's disappearance, was this morning formally charged with having murdered his wife on or about September 9 last, at the very time when, according to his own story, he was in Quebec seeing his wife on a steamer. Cameron made no plea, and the case was adjourned until April 20.

OBSERVED SILENCE
