HIS TEMPERANCE CAREER.

It was perhaps in the forwarding of temperance matters and during the passage of legislation governing the sale of liquor that Mr. Smith came into the general public eye most prominently. Beginning as a member of The Sons of Temperance and the different federations and alliances organized for the attainment of prohibition, he was keenly active. As far back as 1878 he was secretary of a committee appointed to secure if possible the adoption of The Scott Act in Saint John. He was a member of the Anti-License League of New Brunswick and of the New Brunswick Temperance Federation, founded in this city in 1905, being its president from 1907 to 1911. In 1896 he joined the Saint John Prohibition Association and also was president for some years of the Saint John Temsociation and also was president for some years of the Saint John Temperance Alliance.






