Special Service Squadron Arrives

Another event in Newfoundland
history has taken place with the com-
ing of the Special Service Squadron
to the waters of Terra Nova.

At 9 o'clock a.m. on Saturday last
the H.M.S. Hood, H.M.S. Repulse,
H.M.S. Adelaide and R.F.A. Serbol
passed the Narrows and steamed
to Topsail Bay, their final port of
call before returning to England af-
ter a ten months' cruise 'round the Em-
pire.

The Hood is the largest ship which
has ever visited Newfoundland wa-
ters. The Woolworth Building in
New York is the tallest building in
the world and yet the Hood on end
would overtop it. Those who re-
member the "Raleigh" will be sur-
prised to know that the "Hood" is
200 feet longer.

The many who visited Topsail
were pleased to see the practical in-
terest that was taken by the heads
of the respective Departments who
had necessary improvements carried
at Topsail. The wharf has been
electrically lighted and several land-
ing stairs provided for the visitors,
whilst the roads to it have been
much improved as well as lighted as
far as Topsail station.

H.M.S. Hood is the largest battle-
ship afloat. (The U.S.S. Massachu-
setts, which displaces 43,000 tons in
comparison with the Hood's 41,000,
has not yet been completed, all work
on her having been suspended since
the terms of the Disarmament Con-
ference at Washington, came into ef-
fect.) Tonnage, 41,000; length, 866
feet; beam, 105 feet; draft, 33 feet;
armament 8 15-inch; 12 5.5-inch; and
4 4-inch.

H.M.S. Repulse is a battle-
cruiser of the 'Renown' class. Ton-
nage 26,500; length 784 feet; beam,
90 feet; draft, 30 feet; armament 6 15
inch; 17 4-inch; 2 3-inch; H. A.
Brown-Curtis direct drive turbines,
four screw, developing 112,000 h.p.,
giving a speed of 31.5 knots. Com-
plement 1,200 men.

H.M.A.S. "Adelaide" is one of the
cruisers of the Australian Navy and
is manned by them, with the excep-
tion of several officers who have
been lent to the R.A.N. by the Ad-
miralty. She was built at the Com-
monwealth Dockyard at Sydney, N.
S.W. Tonnage, 5,450; length, 430
feet; beam 49 feet; draft 18 feet; ar-
mament 8 6-inch; 1 3-inch; 4 3-pdr.
A.A. Parsons turbine, four screw,
developing 25,000 S.H.P., with a speed
of 24 knots. Complement 650 men.

R.F.A. "Serbol" is an oiler which
has come here to deliver oil to the
ships for the last lap of their Empire
cruise. Tonnage 5,042. Capacity 2,000
tons. She is a Fleet Auxiliary and as
such under the Blue Ensign. Her of-
ficers and crew are obtained from
the Mercantile Marine. She sails again
on the 13th.

These are the ships that have been
together with the Light Cruiser
Squadron, (Delhi, Dragon, Danae,
Dauntless), carrying to Britons in
the remotest and nearest parts of
our far-flung Empire the message of
the nation's power. It serves to
remind us that the Empire lives.
Their work of showing the flag is
nearly over, for after about a fort-
night's stay they sail for England.

By making Newfoundland the last
stop before going back to the
Motherland they have forged an un-
breakable link in the chain which
binds Britain's overseas Dominions
together. Long may the ships and
crews do service for our great Em-
pire.

Major Windler, M.C., is arranging a live
fall and winter programme. Trinity East,
under Captain Fitzgerald, is progressing
splendidly. The strength is now 40 and
an average attendance of 32. We con-
gratulate Corporal Thomas Rex and
Lance Corporal Graham Day and Acting
Lance Corporal Cecil Randall on their
promotions. The O. C. mentions Lieut.
W. Bannister in his despatches to Head-
quarters as having done yeoman service
for the company during the absence on
leave of Lieut. Ploughman and Rendell.

Overseas news by mail, in a letter dated
31st, July from Nairobi tells us our old
friend Colonel W. H. Franklin, D. S. O.
now H. B. Majesty's Trade Commissioner
for East Africa is much better in health
and has just returned from a long tour of
ex-German East Tanganyika Territory.
This area is about seven times as large as
the British Isles. Colonel Franklin is
keenly interested in his duties and is glad
to hear the Newfoundland Regiment, C.
L. B. is carrying on so splendidly.

Major Williams is glad to have a copy
of the Special paper issued by the C.L.B.
South African Regiments. Their head-
quarters being Church House, Cape Town
The Church Girls' Brigade is being or-
ganized and is making good progress. We
congratulate our South African Comrades
on their enthusiasm and success.

Thursday night Ptes. Richard and
Harold Mossell sixteen year old twins
visited H. Q. and applied for transfer to
Field College Company, which was grant-
ed. These lads are fine specimens of
boyhood and were born at Port aux
Basques and are continuing their studies
at Bishop Field College where we wish
them every success.

The attendance barometer this week at

visit the biggest battleship afloat, H.M.S.
Hood, on Tuesday next. All ranks are

mitted to visit such a giant of the seas.

arranged by railway and the ships' boats
will convey the C.L.B. The boats leave
Topsail at 2 p.m. and return at 5 o'clock.
All ranks will arrange for their own food
supply—the Quartermaster only supply-
ing hot tea at 5.30 p.m. This courtesy of
the navy is very much appreciated. A
conference of the staff last night finalised
the arrangements. Lt.-Col. W. F. Ren-
dell, Brigade Major Williams, Captains
A. Morris, P.B. Rendell, S. Horsley, F.
Burden, H. C. Hayward, Lieuts. W. R.
Motty, Eric Jerrett, were on duty with

at 2.30 p.m. in order to attend Divine
