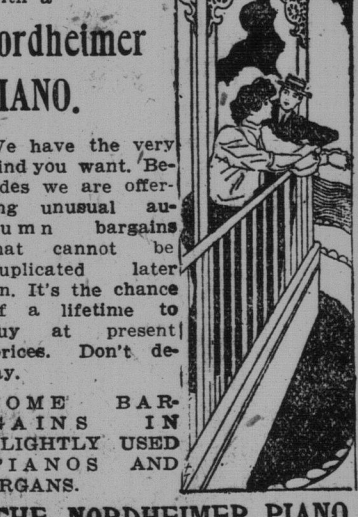
SAYS RUSSELL USED FALSE INDUCEMENTS. FORGET

PRINCE LOUIS COMES THE 26TH.

Festivities Will Include Public Reception—Mayor White Will Give a Dinner.

Prezler Tweedie, who was in the city in connection with the Loggie v. Montgomery case in equity court, left last evening for Chatham. Speaking of the arrangements made for Prince Louis's visit here, he said nothing definite had been agreed upon. This much they know, that the Prince would arrive in St. John on Thursday, 26th inst. The premier is expected to meet with Mayor White while in the city, and the arrangements at present include a public reception and dinner. It is expected that Lieutenant General Snowball, Mayor White and the premier will call on the Prince on his arrival here and pay their respects. In the evening a public reception will be held, probably at the Opera House, after which the visitor will be entertained at dinner by the mayor. Premier Tweedie said that he would consult the governor when in Chatham and complete arrangements. He will return to the city on Thursday.

STRUCK OIL IN A WELL.

An old well some twenty feet deep, on the property of Mr. R. McDougall at Selma, Hants County, has been abandoned because of the very pronounced presence of petroleum with the water. The well was emptied of all water several times to be sure the oil did not come from any source near the surface. Each time the water filled it, it was brought with it a quantity of mineral oil. Mr. McDougall and his neighbor, Mr. Gavin L. Stairs, who is also interested in the find, are sure they have "struck oil." Samples of the mixture taken from the well, have been sent to experts. Mr. Wm. Dickson, of Truro, was on the ground when the well was being emptied, and says the water was covered with a decidedly oily substance, and every indication points to petroleum.—Truro News.
