CASE AGAINST SECORD DISMISSED.
Magistrate Found Evidence in Favor of Defense.

Young Kelly Was Also Allowed to go—Secord's Counsel Sharply Criticized Action of Officer Marshall.

The Secord case was resumed this morning when Mr. Mullin cross-questioned the defendant. Secord said that when he was pulled off the road cart his coat came half off and when he started for the team that was running away it came off all the way, his hat also fell off. The officer would not allow him to put it on. The coat was torn, his trousers were torn and his hat was in the bottom of the cart. He asked the policeman for the hat and he wouldn't give it to him. Witness said he was not with Littlejohn or Garriek at the time they offered to pay witness for driving them in. They left Newcombe's at seven o'clock, stopped ten minutes at the one mile house and arrived in the city about 8.30 o'clock. The horse was warm but not overheated. Witness said he was not drunk and was capable of looking after the horse.

Mr. Mullin then addressed the court. He said that Secord was not drunk and that the policeman was most unjustified in pulling the young fellow from the team and allowing the horse to run away, "that was the conduct of a man who is not fit to wear the uniform of a policeman," said Mr. Mullin. The policeman also hears vile language from Dan Littlejohn, a pugilist, and this policeman invites Dan Littlejohn to come and repeat the language. The officer ran amuck that day and did wrong. He is the champion of the police force who, when he could not get into trouble with Dan Littlejohn went after young Secord.

It would be a slang phrase, but it would be a good thing for the public if this officer was "put in the bum" and that the public indignation was shown when one of the crowd at the time of the arrest, Judge Ritchie put one of you on the bum and you will be the next.

The whole trouble came about by the want of judgment on the part of the officer, and that under the three charges he was not guilty and should be discharged.

The magistrate speaking on the case said there was considerable contradiction in the evidence, but it was not his duty to decide. He was on duty, that he had been informed that Secord and others were abusing him, and he was called to the scene. Littlejohn was vile, a crown witness said the policeman invited Littlejohn to come out. A crown witness said he did not hear Secord use bad language and was not with him. The man was hauled out of his cart and the horse ran away. The worst thing the boy said when he was taken off the cart was, "Charlie, let me go home."

The magistrate said he did not fear any person. He used all alike and it was not a case of "putting persons on the bum." He did not care what the critics say, he used all alike. If Secord had violated the law why was he not arrested at the time. The witnesses called by the defence were decent looking and those who heard Mr. Shanklin could not have done other than believe him. That witness said he did not see the boy do anything, but that Marshall was doing wrong.

The police are to be protected, and of all those in the crowd only one offered to assist the policeman, that was young Kelly who instead of being found guilty should be congratulated. The prisoner, according to the evidence was civil, and the judge said it was hard for a man to be civil under the circumstances.

Police officers should prevent scenes instead of causing them, and the weight of evidence is in favor of the defence. The case was dismissed.

There was no evidence, he said, against Kelly, and the evidence was in favor of the defence. Secord was therefore dismissed.
