COAL AND WOOD.

Take the coalfields of the province, whether those of the island or those of the mainland. The Fernie mines ship immense quantities into the States of Washington and Montana, and the Vancouver Island mines supply all California, So with lumber. In addition to the rapidly expanding market over the mountains, there is an immense and increasing demand for British Columbia lumber in the western States, Indeed, it is largely this demand from the United States, both for coal and twood—the latter apart from lumber—that has brought about something in the nature of a fuel famine even here and at Vancouver, in the midst of an apparently plentiful supply of both. A fuel famine on the prairies, hundreds of miles from the mines, and after the latter have been closed down for many months by a strike, is intelligible; but it is the last thing one expects to find here, within sight of the forests and within three hours' run of the mines. It is the very proximity of the mines that has caused, in part, a coal shortage, neither Victoria or Vancouver having troubled to provide a reserve, so easily have they obtained coal in the past.
