Mr. Andrew M. Douglas, of New Glasgow, was in the city today, and in conversation with the Star said that conditions in Pictou county during the winter had been rather dull owing to the prevalence of smallpox. Some months ago all the churches in New Glasgow were closed because of the existence of this disease, but were reopened after two weeks.
