PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, April 6.
At the urgent request of the State Department at Washington, communicated to the London Foreign Office, the British government has decided not to permit Cipriano Castro, former President of Venezuela to land at Trinidad.

Cypriano Castro is returning to the West Indies from Europe with the avowed purpose of the recovery of the Presidency of Venezuela. He left France March 26 on board steamer Guadeloupe. Where he purposes to land in the West Indies is not definitely known
