NEGOTIATIONS DECLARED OFF; PITTSBURG STRIKE IS ON

Mayor Magee Will Try to Bring Company and Men To Agreement—Protection Demanded for strike Breakers—Constables Enrolled

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 28.—Following three joint conferences last night between officials of the Pittsburgh Railway Co. and National President Mahon, of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees and the district grievance committee all negotiations looking towards the termination of the street car strike in Greater Pittsburgh, were declared off and therefore the strike now is on earnest.

Mayor Magee, however, is making an effort to bring about a speedy settlement and to that end has invited the traction officials and leaders of the striking employees to meet in his offices this afternoon to discuss the questions at issue.

Beginning this morning bunks were placed in all the car barns to house the strike breakers expected here during the day.

P. E. ISLANDERS WINNERS OF DEGREES AT HARVARD

OTHER ARRESTS WILL PROBABLY BE MADE

Following the Murder of Mrs. Edith Woodhill Eastman May Not Have Been the Only One Involved—Some are Inclined to Credit His Story.

ST. MICHAEL, Md., June 28.—The coroner's inquest into the death of Mrs. Edith May Woodhill will be resumed today with several of the jurors still convinced that there was a large element of truth in the letter left by "Lama Doo" Eastman, the fugitive broker and suicide, who declared that there had been a party in his bungalow and that Mrs. Woodhill had been attacked with a champagne bottle and slain by a jealous woman.

The jury will meet in the lonely little bungalow (site within sight of the grave) to which the body of Eastman was consigned early yesterday with no further ceremony than the muttered prayers of a few laymen.

It is not believed now that a definite verdict will be rendered by the jury and it is certain no matter what may be the outcome of today's sitting of the inquest, investigation of the tragedy will be carried forward by the law officers of the state and county with undiminished energy.

The members of the coroner's jury who believe that there is truth in Eastman's letter are anxious that the mystery of the bungalow containing two women and a man who was known as "Lama Doo" should be cleared up.
