REV. NAPOLEON PAPINEAU WAS ORDAINED PRIEST

Impressive Ceremony in Cathedral This Morning in Presence of Large Congregation.

Rev. Napoleon Papineau was this morning ordained priest in the Cathedral by His Lordship Bishop Casey. The ceremony took place at the seven o'clock mass in the presence of a large congregation. Rev. Father Papineau was ordained deacon yesterday.

He was assisted this morning by Rev. L. Guertin, superior of St. Joseph's college. Rev. A. W. Moilan and Rev. D. S. O'Keefe assisted His Lordship. Rev. L. V. Bronnighall, prefect of English studies at St. Joseph's, Rev. William Duke and Michael O'Brien were also in the sanctuary.

Rev. Napoleon Papineau, C. S. C., will return to his home in Montreal this evening on a short visit. He has been connected during the past few years with the teaching staff in French at St. Joseph's University. He will again be stationed at the college.

REBEKAH ASSEMBLY INSTALLED OFFICERS

Last evening the degree team from Jewel Rebekah Lodge exemplified the Rebekah degree before a large gathering in the Seaman's Mission. The work was splendidly done, and received the warmest praise. During the latter part of the evening refreshments were served.

BOY DESERTER SENT BACK TO VESSEL

Only one prisoner faced the magistrate this morning. Alfred Yepsen, a youthful sailor, charged by Captain Svane with leaving the barque Astra in opposition to orders. The lad is about 14 years old and was signed on by his father for two years. He claimed to have been roughly handled by the captain and made while the captain told a very different story. In Captain Svane claimed Yepsen had been enticed to desert by a fellow countryman who keeps a boarding house on South Market wharf.

The magistrate, by the aid of an interpreter, told the prisoner the penalty for desertion, and advised him to make no further attempt to leave the ship.

Sergeant Baxter, who made the arrest, took the lad back to the Astra at the captain's request, as the bark will sail this afternoon.

DAM AT ST. JOSEPHS NEARLY COMPLETED

New Lake Thus Formed Will Add Greatly to Beauty of the Grounds—College Opens September 7th.

Talking with the Star this morning, Rev. L. Guertin, superior of St. Joseph's University, stated that the studies at the college would be resumed on September 7. There would probably be some changes in the teaching staff, but the new prefects had not as yet been announced.

An enormous work has been practically completed in the construction of a dam on the college grounds. St. Joseph's park is widely known for its beauty. However, the lake some time ago was trying to break down the dam. The college prefects were determined that the beauty of the park should not be marred by the absence of the lake. Tenders were called for and the contract for building a new dam on the grounds was awarded to J. B. Gaudet & Son of St. Joseph.

During the present vacation the firm has made excellent progress in the construction and the earthwork is about completed. The dam has been placed 100 feet below the old one and brings the level of the water about two feet above the former one. The contract necessitates the expenditure of between \$2,000 and \$3,000. The new dam is about 18 feet high.

General improvements have been made to the college buildings, but no radical changes or extensions have been made.

Rev. Fr. Guertin returned to the college at noon today. He was in the city in connection with the ordination of Rev. Napoleon Papineau.

GRAND FALLS POWER COMPANY IN COURT

Right of Expropriation Causes Trouble.

Commissioner Winslow Opens Hearing—Imposing Array of Legal Talent—Sir Wm. Van Horne Takes a Hand

In the Equity Court room this morning the hearing in the dispute between the present Grand Falls Power Company and a number of private land owners at Grand Falls, was commenced. The proceedings are being conducted at the instigation of the local government who appointed J. N. W. Winslow a special commissioner in the matter. The present company has the right to expropriate and the difficulty is as to the value of the land. After taking evidence in the matter, the court adjourned at 1.15 o'clock for lunch, and will resume at 2.30 o'clock.

H. A. Powell, K. C., is appearing for the Grand Falls Power Company and has associated with him, Barnhill, Ewing and Sanford, A. L. Sherrill, of New York; J. B. Maclean, chief engineer, and R. S. Lee and D. W. Jamieson, engineers, were also in attendance on behalf of the company.

H. H. McLean, K. C., and P. R. Taylor are appearing in the interests of the land owners in the case. Sir William Van Horne, W. P. Holt, engineer, and W. F. Lynch, secretary, are also in attendance.

William A. C. Rice, of Worcester, mechanical engineer, who had prepared a report on the power available, was the chief witness at this morning's session. He was examined by both counsel.

Referring to his report on electrical transmission, Engineer Rice stated that 80,000 horse power could be developed. He believed the construction of the dam as contemplated by the Grand Falls Power Company, would destroy the water privileges, which the land owners claim to possess. For legal purposes the Grand Falls would have the advantage over the St. Lawrence, on account of the former being in close proximity to the port of St. John.

On his examination by H. A. Powell, the witness stated he based his estimate of the amount of horse power on the measurement of the river, which he had secured as well as the storages. The latter term is applied to a series of reservoirs or dams further up the St. John river and its tributaries. In his estimate of 80,000 horse power he was not speaking alone of the falls, but also of the storages.

He had based his estimate of the cost of horse power at \$5 per year from the flow of the river and the fall of 133 feet which could be secured.

Mr. Powell was somewhat surprised at the statement that 130 feet fall could be secured. He declared that 50 feet of fall was the estimate. In the estimate, however, the total fall from the upper to the lower basin had been included, he had no records that the fall was not available for more than 35 feet.

Continuing, Engineer Rice said that the lowest horse power he noticed was \$3,387, but the following day the horse power reached \$7,000.

It is quite probable that Sir William Van Horne will give testimony at the hearing today.
