REIGN OF TERROR.

Coal Strikers Hold Shenandoah at Their Mercy.

Fought the Police With Guns, Revolvers, Stones and Other Missiles and Drove Them Off Like Sheep.

A Prominent Merchant Killed By the Infuriated Mob and Two Policemen Brutally Beaten—Over One Thousand Shots Fired in the Encounter—A Call for Troops Made on the Governor of the State.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., July 30.—A reign of terror compared with the scenes enacted during the riots of 1900 seem insignificant, holds Shenandoah in its grasp tonight. Since six o'clock this evening Centre street, which is one of the principal streets of the town, has been in the hands of an infuriated mob.

Joseph Beddal, a leading merchant and cousin of Sheriff Beddal, was brutally clubbed to death, and upwards of a score of strikers whose names at this writing could not be ascertained, were shot by policemen, and it is expected that many deaths will result.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., July 30.—Adjutant General Stewart is at his office tonight, prepared to direct the movement of the troops if it should be decided to respond to the sheriff's call. Everything is in readiness at the state arsenal to ship the canvas and camp equipment, and if it should be decided to order out the third brigade tonight, the entire four regiments could be laid at Shenandoah before morning.
