SEAMEN TELL THRILLING STORY OF RESCUE BY MOUNT TEMPLE

Capt. William Coffil of Wrecked Schooner Lone Star and Two Sons Spent Two Desperate Days Drifting in Bay--Returned to Grand Manan Homes-Winter Port Notes.

After a good passage the big C. P. R. liner Mount Temple arrived in port yesterday afternoon and docked at 2 o'clock at No. 1 berth, Sand Point. She cama Trom Londoor and 'Antwerp direct and brought to this port 677 passengers of which 532 were destined for Canada and the remainder for the United States. All boarded the steamer at Antwerp and all were continentals being made up of Swedes, Russians, Belglans and Hungarians. They were a fairly good looking lot and except for a few mild cases of measles, the steamer had a clean bill of health. The Mount Temple also had a fairly large cargo.

The voyage from the Belgian port was without incident until the steamer was entering the bay yesterday morning. Captain Coffil and crew managed to cling to the wreckage and floated until yesterday morning when the Mount Temple rescued them. When the steamer sighted the men they were exhausted with their battle as the waves washed over them and threatened to snatch them from their frail support.

The greatest number of these are Belgians and Hungarlans, and they are held because they lack \$50. Many, it is said, are practically penniless. It is said that arrangements will be made to permit those who have friends willing to pat up \$50 to proceed to their destination. The other day the authorities held up sixty of the immigrants who arrived on the Pomeranian.
