YOUNG VICS 8; CUBS 5.

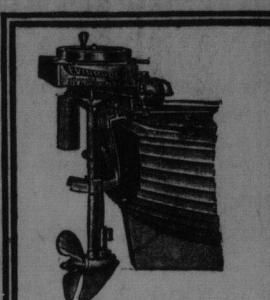

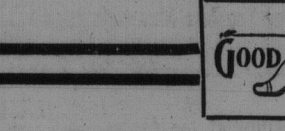
