CHARLOTTETOWN MAN IS DEAD IN TORONTO

John R. Copp Receives Word of Death of Fred H. Sellar, Attended Sovereign Grand Lodge

John R. Copp, of the postal service, received a message from Toronto Saturday morning telling of the death there on Thursday of his brother-in-law Fred H. Sellar, a prominent business man of Charlottetown, P. E. Island. At a meeting of the Oddfellows Grand Lodge in Yarmouth in August Mr. Sellar was appointed to represent the Maritime Provinces at the meeting of the Oddfellows Sovereign Grand Lodge at Winnipeg in September, and although not in the best of health Mr. Sellar and J. J. MacKinnon, accompanied by their wives, undertook the mission. When Mr. Sellar arrived in Toronto he called on one of the prominent doctors and was informed that his health could stand the trip provided he took it quietly, but on the return journey he was taken seriously ill at Toronto and died on Thursday last.

His death will be a sad shock to Island and other friends. Mr. Sellar carried on a successful grocery business in Charlottetown, was president of the Young Men's Liberal Club, and was active in various fraternal organizations, including the Masons, Oddfellows and Orangemen. His wife is a daughter of the late W. Chandler, and a sister of Mrs. Copp, survives, also three children, two sons and a daughter. The two youngest children are now in the city with Mr. Copp. The funeral will take place at Charlottetown tomorrow.

Mrs. M. B. Brown. At noon Saturday occurred the death of Mrs. Brown, widow of Hazen B. Brown, at her residence, 27 Sherbrooke street. Before her marriage to Mr. Brown, who died about two years ago, she was Miss Lizette Owen. She was a native of this city and had resided in the North End all her life. For the last fourteen years she had been an invalid, but it was only recently that her illness took a fatal turn. She is survived by three sons, Hazen B. and Oscar of this city, and Harry in New Hampshire; two daughters, Mrs. Walter Kitchin of this city, and Miss Dolly at home; and one sister, Mrs. James Mackie, step of E. John. The funeral will take place this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from her late residence.

SALVATION ARMY HELD THREE GOOD MEETINGS

Senator Daniel Presided at Afternoon Meeting in Opera House, Many Prominent Citizens Attended—Col. Mapp Describes Work Accomplished by Army in Many Lands.

Sunday was a day of particular interest to the Salvation Army officers and soldiers gathered in this city in annual congress. The three services held during the day were thrown open to the public, and the efforts of the Army met with a hearty co-operation. At all services held at the Opera House there were large gatherings, and there was evidenced in the proceedings an unusual warmth and enthusiasm. In the morning and evening the services were essentially religious in their character. In the afternoon, however, a number of prominent citizens participated in the meeting, which was presided over by Senator Daniel. In the morning at 11 o'clock the visiting delegates to the congress, as well as the officers and soldiers of the local corps joined in a holiness meeting. The service took the form of a regular Salvation service. Commissioner Rees was the principal speaker at the meeting, at the close of which seventeen were converted. Commissioner Rees took as his text the words "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God." In an eloquent sermon replete with his characteristic warmth and enthusiasm, the speaker pointed out the possibility of living a pure life, the condition of attaining it, and the results accruing a life of pure morals. The words of the speaker were given attention throughout. A number of the visiting officers took part in the service of the morning.

Afternoon Service. In the afternoon at three o'clock the Opera House was crowded for the public service. The chief speaker at the meeting was Col. Mapp, for the past four years chief secretary of the Army in Canada, who has been recalled to England to take another appointment. The chief secretary in the course of the afternoon farewell remarks were made by the Commissioner, who led the religious portion of the proceedings, and an appreciation of the Army's work was given by Senator Daniel. The chairman, Senator Daniel, in a stirring address, passed in review the excellent work which the Army has accomplished, and paid a glowing tribute to the late founder of the Army, General Booth.

After expressing his pleasure at being present to do honor to the chief of the Army in Canada, and his able assistant, Col. Mapp, Senator Daniel said that the time for saying much for the Army and giving reasons for its existence has passed, and there is no longer need to make defense of it. The magnificent deeds and the monuments of the wonderful organization, scattered nearly all over the world, bear silent testimony of the usefulness and humanly motives which inspired its founder and animates the officers and soldiers of the Army.

The late lamented leader of the Army, General Booth, realizing the possibilities for an organization which would do the work which the Army is doing, has built up a wonderful work.

the founders were persecuted when they went and published as public nuisances. As an example of the extremes to which recourse was had to silence the early growth of the Army, he referred to the edict published in Russia where anyone bearing the name Booth was forbidden to enter the country for fear the Army would get a footing. The persistence and courage of the founders together with the realization on the part of the world of the usefulness of the organization has overcome this attitude, and today the Army is to be found in thirty-four languages, and the members of the organization number thousands. Today eighty one periodicals and magazines are published in the interests of the work of the Army, and the departments of the work have multiplied so as to deal with nearly all phases of suffering.
