Miss Saunders showed exactly how to mix and bake a loaf of bread and dictated splendid recipes for various kinds of bread and biscuits. While the bread was cooking in the oven she spoke at length on the subject of left-overs. This talk contained many valuable hints of the ways to serve tables and rice. In combinations and with the proper food values substantial meals can be supplied from left-overs. Miss Saunders' demonstration was a success. The proper cooking of the tougher parts of meat was described and the use of the casserole or covered baking dish advocated. Soups, croquettes, scallops and salads were some of the ways suggested to use up food.

The lecture took the place of the regular meeting of the Housewives' League. Mrs. Lawlor presided.

FRANCE WILL SEE FILMS OF AMERICAN ARMY.

Gaumont is making pictures of America's Military Preparations for Release Abroad.

YAPHANK AND WEST POINT. Although it has not been generally known, the Gaumont Company has been making pictures of America's military preparations for release in France through the Societe des Etablissements Gaumont.

The pictures have been made under the direction of Pell Mitchell, editor of the Gaumont-Mutual. At Yaphank the cantonment is being rushed to completion to house forty thousand men of the new national army. The grounds and buildings were "shot" from all angles, so that the people of republic across the ocean may see for themselves how whole-hearted America is getting into the war.

Among other pictures taken for release in France are a complete series of views of activities at West Point. Naturally, the Gaumont Company is also sending abroad many pictures which have appeared within the last few weeks in the Gaumont-Mutual Weekly. These pictures will appear first in the German Palace Actualities, the news reel which is part of the programme at the Gaumont Palace the largest motion picture theatre in the world.

Fredericton, Aug. 14.—The election for county councillors of the municipality of York will be held on Tuesday, September 4th. The election is only held every two years and the councillors thus elected hold office for two years. This year the election will attract a little more than ordinary interest as since the last election the parish of St. Mary's has become an incorporated town. A representative from the board of aldermen of the town of Devon will be appointed for the county council. From present indications the old council board will offer for re-election.

The election for a mayor and board of aldermen for the newly incorporated town of Devon will be held on Monday next, August 20. Sheriff Hawthorn will act as the returning officer and the following gentlemen will offer as candidates, and it is expected that they will be elected by acclamation.

For Mayor, Gilbert Henry; for aldermen, W. B. Dayton, R. A. Malloy, A. E. Rockwell, Ashley Collier, Harry Fickard, George Ward, A. J. Bailey and A. J. McEvoy.

The re-nominations for the county elections closed on Monday, August 13, at six o'clock. They will be filed with the parish clerks of each parish. The newly elected councillors do not take office until the session in January, 1918, as the present councillors hold office until that time.
