## Brooklyn Leads National Race

Cleveland, in the American League, gained a few points by defeating New York and sending the Yankees to third place while the Chicago White Sox won from Boston and climbed into second place.

## Peter Manning Wins Feature Event

The Champion 4-Year Old Easily Outclasses Field in \$10,000 Classic at Hartford

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 9.—Peter Manning, champion 4-year old trotter, this afternoon won the classic event of the Grand Circuit meet here. His victory was an easy one, the son of Azoff easily having the speed of the field and coming home on the stretch with a lead of nearly two lengths in each of the two heats won. It was Murphy's third win of the meeting and the third consecutive year that he has won the Charter Oak stake.

Billy Croder, the local driver, was the big winner of the afternoon, taking first with Ethel Chimes, a Murphy pacer, in the bitterly fought 2:10 pace and winning the 2:15 pace with Billy Sunday, a member of the Pittman stable. The free-for-all for 3-year old trotting colts was unfinished at the end of the third heat, Worthy Chief, Jane the Great, and Star Hertha each winning a heat. This race will be finished tomorrow, Get-Away Day.

The 2:10 pace brought out the closest finishes of the afternoon when the two entries from the Murphy stables successfully kept the favorite, Edna Early, from winning the event.

Charles G. Hopton of New York City Finished Judging Last Evening—Irish Setter Owned by Mrs. E. J. Wallace, St. John, Best Dog in Show—Presentation of Prizes.

Sonora Rhesa Jess, an Irish setter bitch, has the signal honor of being the best dog in the 1920 show of the N. B. Kennel Club. She is owned by Mrs. E. J. Wallace, wife of the superintendent of the show. The decision was made last evening at the kennel club's office by Judge Charles G. Hopton, of New York City. Britannia's Pride, an English setter bitch, owned by James Latimer, was reserve.

## A Compliment

It is a great compliment to St. John sporting dog fanciers to have two gun dogs the best in the show. What oneness their victory over Victorious Wm. Mackin's fine build dog, is the fact that Judge Hopton is himself a famous build dog breeder, and it clearly shows that the best dog won. The setters are both of a very high class and the Standard has it from Judge Hopton that either one of them would make a name for themselves in the premier New York show.

Without a doubt, the show this year has been the best in the history of the club. The class of dogs was much better than any previous year, while it also surpassed all others in the point of numbers. There were a much larger number of Nova Scotia dogs in the show this year than former years, and all the dogs were of good quality. Keen interest was taken in the show by the general public, and a feeling of pride has been stirred up in the class of dogs now owned by New Brunswick fanciers.

## Horses Entering From The States

Those Entered in Races Will Not be Held up Over Veterinary Inspections.

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 9.—Horses entering the Maritime Provinces from the New England states for the harness races during the next few weeks will find the barrier of red tape over veterinary inspections, which held up some of the stables in July swept aside.

When several strings were held up at Aroostook Junction in July, on their way to race, the Fredericton Park Association took the matter up with Hon. Arthur Meighen, and instructions were then issued to the inspectors in New Brunswick that the entry of the race horses was to be facilitated as much as possible.

This week a letter has come from Premier Meighen, enclosing a memorandum from Dr. Torrance, veterinary director-general, in which he writes that instructions have already been sent out with regard to admitting horses coming in for the fall fairs and races.
