WINDSOR OR MIDDLETON?

As reported in another column last Wednesday for the purpose of trying to secure the Appro Krip industry to locate there instead of at Middleton. The advertisement calling the meeting stated that Appro Krip was desirous of locating at Windsor. We wrote the company and asked if it were so, and in reply they stated they were not responsible for the advertisement. However, we can gather a certain gentleman has offered to subscribe for \$20,000 worth of stock under certain conditions. These conditions if considered might possibly change the entire business. The Executive of the company upon which it has been working. Part of these conditions, as we understand them, are: that the company locate at Windsor, that \$40,000 be subscribed by citizens of Windsor and district, and that the directors consist of those who subscribe \$10,000 or more stock. The conditions may seem all right, but are there not wholly dictatorial? Windsor close enough to the source of supply? And, what is going to become of the small investor? Of course Appro Krip knows its own business best; not being well enough versed to tell an inside story. We have faith in the directors to weigh all things well, and we feel that the quality of the grain, conditions is really the ideal place—all things considered.

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CANADIAN BUSINESS CONDITIONS

The upward trend of business activity has continued during the past month and become more widespread with the effective increase in agricultural purchasing power. Tangible figures of production trade and transportation for October show general gains.

The total yield of wheat in Canada is now provisionally estimated by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at 422,327,000 bush, an upward revision of 30,500,000 bush from the preliminary estimates, due chiefly to better estimates of the small investor. Of these 81.9 per cent have been Contract Grades. This compares with 51,644 cars inspected from August 1st to November 6th, 1924, of which 63 per cent were Contract Grades. Western wheat acreage has been the largest on record, and the movement of the crop has proceeded with almost unprecedented rapidity. From August 1st to November 6th, 36,836 cars of wheat have been inspected at Winnipeg. Of these 81.9 per cent have been Contract Grades.
