To the Editor of The Transcript.
Dear Sir,—The returns of the effort on Trafalgar Day of the 19th ult. being now in, would you be so good as to insert this communication in your local column. Considering the continual effort of our societies here on behalf of the Red Cross the response is good.

Excellent assistance was given last year by Mrs. E. Y. Morce and Dr. H. A. Wilson in heading the lists with one hundred dollars each, and others as liberally, and money has been flowing since then during the year by Mrs. Hester to Red Cross work in Toronto and so does not appear in the present list but is indicative of the readiness and good will of the heart of the community. On Trafalgar Day of last year the Patriotic Association of this municipality raised and sent to the Red Cross five hundred dollars and our ladies since then up to the present have raised and sent in goods and money to the Patriotic Association of this municipality. Also the Church of England Guild some one hundred and ten dollars. But above all this some of our boys have gone to the front and some of whom are already on the Honor Roll. The important thing, however, is for every body to be doing something and to show a whole-hearted interest in this beneficent as well as patriotic work, and this is what is being done here with exceedingly few exceptions.

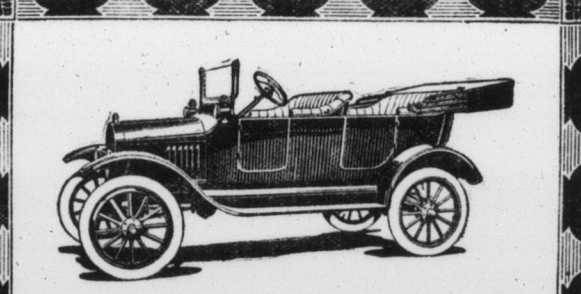
