

RIGHT WING OF FRENCH FORCES

Petrograd. According to these advices the Russian troops which were said several days ago to have penetrated the passes of the Carpathian mountains and begun an invasion of Hungary in force, have captured eight Hungarian towns and surrounded several Austrian troops in the mountains. There was no official confirmation of these statements, however, and the latest official announcement from Vienna asserts that the Austrian forces in Galicia have captured positions and are preparing for further operations.

Although it is admitted in Petrograd that the Germans occupied Russian positions at Bolomow, on the battle front before Warsaw, the Russian war office says that the invaders later were driven back again abandoning six machine guns.

Except for the advance of the French into Alsace, there is little activity in the west. Both sides apparently are content for the present to hold their intrepid positions leaving the fighting largely to artillery.

Paris Still Thronged with Spies. Paris, Jan. 5.—The extraordinary spread of panicky rumors, or more recent wild reports of gigantic German successes, with the object of exciting the people, has often caused the assertions in the press, notably by M. Clemenceau, and even official hints that despite rigorous removal of Austrians and Germans to concentration camps, Paris is still thronged with spies acting in the interest of the enemy.

L'intransigent gives the latest instances of their activity in the shape of a pamphlet entitled "We are being deceived," which during the last week has been distributed nightly under doorways of private houses and cafes in the districts of Clichy, Batignolles and the outer boulevards. The pamphlet contains charges against the government, Catholics, England and Russia, and asserts that General Joffre has given orders to fire on his own troops. It urges the people to demand peace. The police are without a clue to the authors.

Order to Able-Bodied Men. Halifax, N.S., Jan. 5.—Every able-bodied man between the ages of 18 and 42 years on the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness for military service in France, according to advices

received in Halifax by M. Legasse, a St. Pierre merchant, now visiting Halifax. The men of the fishing fleet which makes its annual visit from France to the islands of St. Pierre, were called back early in the war. They were all reservists and expected the call. The natives of the islands remained, however, and continued the shore fishing. It is estimated that out of a population of 5,000 there are at least 1,200 men who will be included in this order, and that when they depart for France about 500 families in St. Pierre Miquelon will be left without support.

It is suggested that there has been some misinterpretation at St. Pierre of the order received from France. According to advices from the islands the order also includes the men of St. Pierre. It is understood that if there has been no mistake representations will be made to the French colonial minister to have it ameliorated. According to the advices received, mobilization commences shortly.

REPORT IS UNFOUNDED

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 4.—The report emanating from Montana to the effect that the international boundary line was to be run 25 miles north from the Great Lakes to the Pacific in exchange for a strip of land in Maine is declared here to be without foundation. Dr. V. C. King, director of international boundary surveys, stated this morning that there had been no change made in the boundary, nor was any contemplated.

He pointed out no change could be made without Imperial sanction. Questioned concerning this feature, Sir Joseph Pope, under secretary of state for external affairs, characterized the report as "wildly improbable."

REIGN OF TYRANNY IN SLAV PROVINCES OF DUAL MONARCHY

Many Prominent People are Imprisoned While Dependents Are Left to Starve.

PRIESTS PUT TO DEATH.

London, Jan. 5.—George Macaulay Trevelyan, noted writer, in a despatch from Rome to the Daily News describes the Austrian-Magyar tyranny in the Slav provinces of the dual monarchy.

"From the beginning of the war, or rather from the time of the murder of the Archduke many thousands of the leading citizens, peasants and priests of the Croat, Slav and Serb races have been imprisoned. In one prison alone there are 700 of these politicians. The parents and wives and children of the prisoners are left to starve, and if any one is seen stirring them a kindness he is likely to find himself in prison the next day."

"In Bosnia many orthodox priests have been shot and many Roman Catholic priests have been imprisoned."

It is a reign of terror. There was never anything worse in the annals of Russia or Austria, either past or present, for not only are the leading citizens imprisoned but the young are all seized as conscripts and sent to die for a cause they detest.

"By a refinement of cruelty a proclamation has been issued that if any soldier desert, his family will suffer for it. Under these circumstances there are few desertions and of course an insurrection is utterly impossible, when all the young men are in the army and all the possible leaders in prison."

"This horrible modern system of war slavery by which a whole population is forced to fight and die for what it hates, exists not only in the south Slav provinces, but in Roumania, Austria and in the Czech and Slovak districts of the north. Truly in time of war the Austro-Hungarian monarchy is an accursed thing. If there has been any doubt about the position problem in the past there will be none about it in the future. It has been a question between liberty and slavery on just the same old terms as the question of Italy sixty years ago or Belgium and Trent today."

AMERICAN RED CROSS HOSPITAL IN SERBIA HAS DONE MUCH GOOD

New York, Jan. 5.—Work of the American Red Cross hospital unit in Serbia under direction of Dr. Edward Ryan, of Scranton, Pa., has saved many lives in and around Belgrade, according to Miss Emily Simmonds, a British red cross nurse who arrived here yesterday on the steamer St. Paul.

Miss Simmonds, a graduate of Roosevelt hospital, New York, was sent with the first British expeditionary force into France and from there to Serbia.

"Since the latter part of August I have been working with the wounded," she said. "With seven young English girls I have worked in the trenches 400 yards from the firing line for 48 hours at a time. The coming of the American unit under Dr. Edward Ryan was a godsend to the Serbians, for at the time of their arrival we were down to our last bits of bandages and dressings and were living on short rations."

"The Serbians were compelled to surrender Belgrade because they were short of ammunition. Up to the arrival of Dr. Ryan and his American nurses, the hospital was constantly in danger of artillery fire. Dr. Ryan's first act was to unfurl the American flag over the building. It was instantly respected and conditions rapidly improved."

"Half of the Serbians are fighting without uniforms. They need medical assistance."

The St. Paul brought 21 Belgian families, consisting of 21 persons, the advance contingent of between 75 and 100 families who expect to settle in the southwestern part of the United States. All six families had homes near Antwerp which were destroyed.

The Duchess of Manchester also was a passenger.

CHICAGO WHEAT PRICES STILL IN ASCENDENCY

Chicago, Jan. 5.—On the very first trades today the wheat market jumped as much as 2 1/2c higher than the close last night, making an advance of five cents a bushel since yesterday morning. May wheat touched \$1.38 at the opening today, whereas the price last night was \$1.33 1/2 and at the wind-up Saturday \$1.31.

Sharply higher quotations from Liverpool and a big falling off in the European visible supply were chiefly influential in causing the fresh upturn in the wheat market here.

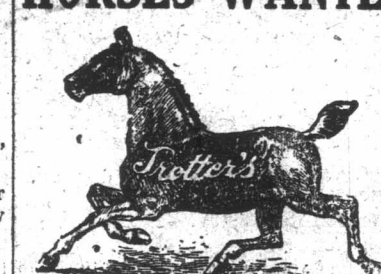
