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NORTH WATERLOO Meeting of Executive Jan 17th. Hon. W.L.M. King present. Good candidates in view; Dr. J.F. Honsberger Berlin and John B. Fischer of Waterloo. Naval issue regarded good campaign ground here.

SOUTH WATERLOO Executive met Jan. 17th. Hon. W.L.M. King present. Prospects discussed with Dr. Thompson of Galt mentioned as a probable candidate.

NORTH WELLINGTON Convention held Jan. 20th, and nominated Dr. Norman C. Wallace of Alma. If prevailed upon to stand he is regarded as a sure winner, as he by common consent is regarded the strongest candidate in the riding

WENTWORTH Good executive meeting Jan. 18th. Decided not to call a convention, as election not likely in near future. Also deem it unwise to have candidate in field too long before election. W.C. Sealey is regarded as the probable candidate, again.

CENTRE YORK Large executive meeting Jan. 17th at general office of The General Association at Toronto. Convention fixed for Feb. 15th. Decided to leave convention entirely free to choose candidate without any recommendations from the executive.

NORTH YORK Convention called for Feb. 22nd at Newmarket Executive unanimous for nomination of W.L.M. King, and it appears probable he will be nominated by acclamation.

REMARKS: Many inquiries from ridings throughout the Province asking for more definite information as to probable time of election. Much hesitation prevails in many places as to calling conventions and fixing candidates until definitely assured of Election time. They are not satisfied with the information that it is impossible to speak in positive terms, and are dubious about making definite arrangements regarding candidates and campaign until absolutely necessary. Expressions of opinions in many quarters are to the effect that the Reciprocity issue is poor fighting ground for the Liberal organization in Ontario. The Naval issue is very generally deemed good fighting ground, and the liberal policy acceptable as compared with the Conservative policy. It is noted however that the public generally is not aroused to more than a limited extent as yet, regarding Naval policy, and there is some ground for the view that the average electors, and particularly in the rural communities are not enthusiastic for any large measure of expenditure on Military.
