something more will be required from Great Britain and
the Dominions, them a mere declaration of constitutional
rights emong themselves. That declaration will have to be
formally communicated by them to the outside world.

Should any of the Dominions not be prepared to give adherence to the principle of Dominion independence, they will, of course, be free to remain constitutionally where they are, or where they desire to be. But their fearfulness should not be an obstacle to these Dominions to which international independence has become an uneavoidable national necessity.
