5. Aleutians Area

U.S. investment of the outer Aleutians began on the lith of May and although bad weather hampered attacks by Allied aircraft over 11,000 U.S. troops had been landed on Attu Island by the 16th. The invasion was preceded and has since been supported by heavy Naval bombardments, which have been effective in temporarily silencing Japanese batteries. On the 18th, the enemy on Attu Island had been driven from the ridge between the east and west arms of Holtz Bay, Attu and driven back at the junction of Massacre and Holtz Bay valleys by a flanking movement.

Despite fog, Allied aircraft based at Amchitka Island bombed installations and air fields both on Attu and Kiska, and while observation was difficult, some hits were seen. Enemy submarines were sighted north of Kiska on the 15th of May and north west of Attu on the 16th. The enemy garrison at Attu Island was estimated to be about 1350 men and that on Kiska about 10,000 men.
