THE LATE HENRY A. HARPER.

The death of Mr. Henry A. Harper, who lost his life yesterday in an attempt to save a drowning woman, was one particularly sad and at the same time one so gallant, brave and noble, that if we could forget the life that has fled, it would be one to rejoice about, comments the London News.

Mr. Harper was a strong, healthy type of the young Canadian. He was a very interesting student, and all who knew him when an undergraduate at Toronto University, predicted for him a brilliant future.

All who were associated with him in newspaper work realized that he was destined to be a leader in the profession.

His death is particularly sad because he had reached a position, where he had become a real factor in the development of Canada. At an early age he had climbed well up the ladder and before him lay the rosy path of a Canadian who was sure to be a credit to himself, to the profession, and to the Canada he loved so well.

Those who knew him intimately, can easily picture in their minds his last heroic act.

The loss sustained by the death of a young man of such promise, cannot be estimated. His brave, noble death, however, should be to those who knew him not, as his life was to those who knew him well, an inspiration to noble, heroic deeds. In the time of trial, when one human being was in danger, he did not hesitate, but gave up his life in an attempt to save another. A greater deed of heroism it is not possible for mortal man to perform.

THE RECORD FOR THE FOOTBALL SEASON.

Seven dead and seventy-five injured is given as the record for the football season in the United States during the season just closed.

The dead are as follows:—Charles Benckman, 19 years old, 887 Kedzie avenue, Chicago, paralyzed by being trampled on in a scrimmage between the Northwesterns and the Advanced Socials, at Kimball and North avenues, Sept. 17. Died Sept. 18.

Edwin Longenecker, 21 years old, quarter-back of the Brown Preparatory school football eleven, spine fractured in practice game at Philadelphia. Died Oct. 13.

John Backner, colored, aged 11 yrs., died at Kirksville, Mo., Nov. 9, as a result of injuries received during football game Nov. 4.

Leon Ayers, aged 19 years, committed suicide at Janesville, Wis., Oct. 7. It was thought that he was mentally unbalanced partly as a result of injuries received in a football game a week previous to his death.

Robt. L. McKee, died at Alma, Mich., Oct. 8, as the result of injuries received Oct. 5 in Detroit in a game between the Detroit Athletic club football team and the Alma college team. Went into the game in a serious condition from an old rupture. In the second half he was fiercely attacked and the old trouble aggravated.

John L. Segrist died at Columbus, O., Oct. 28, from injuries received Oct. 20 in the football game between Ohio State university and the Western Reserve team. His neck was broken and the spinal cord crushed, causing paralysis of the neck down.

David Wark, aged 20 years, electrocuted at Philadelphia while playing football. Ball lodged in globe of electric light, and Wark caught the full current trying to rescue it.

more money for the publisher in re-issuing the old book, than in getting up a new one, says the Toronto News. To the latter class belong the geographies, for the maps cost so much to renew that unless the publisher get a far greater price for them than the government dare sanction, there would be less money in a new book than in a new edition of the old work. Consequently, when The Globe charges the opposition with inconsistency in accusing the government at one time of using new school books too frequently and again not frequently enough, it only succeeds in convincing people of the dishonesty of its own part in the argument. The real fact is that the books are changed to suit the interests of the publishers. We need only to go over a list of the books that have been authorized by the department during the last half dozen years to find indisputable evidence of this, and Mr. G. N. Morang's testimony regarding the pull of certain publishing houses is merely corroboration of what is an old story to people who have been paying any attention to the school book question.

The worst feature of the matter is that there is apparently no intention on the part of the government to administer this department honestly in the future. In his Wingham denial a few days ago, the Premier denied that a school book combine existed in Ontario. Instead of promising amendment he and his colleagues have the hardihood to claim that they have done no wrong, and that a department, which has been shown to be rotten to the core has done its work effectively. Their attitude in this matter must be taken as earnest of their intention to continue in the same course, and they are re-elected the people will know what to expect.

COLONIAL LOYALTY.

Lord Salisbury, in his speech at the Guildhall banquet, made it clear that Great Britain can well afford to ignore the enmity of foreign countries so long as she possesses the cordial approval and support of her colonial kinsmen, points out the Guelph Herald.

Protracted and disastrous as this war has been, though serious the misery and poignant the grief that it has brought to many homes and heavy the burdens that it has imposed upon the nation, it has produced—apart altogether from its effects in South Africa—one great and enduring blessing. Before it began Britain's strength was measured by the extent and efficiency of her navy and standing army. The colonies were not taken into account. The ready and effective aid rendered the mother land by Canada, Australia and New Zealand, has introduced a new element, which must be reckoned with in all future calculations of the military resources of the Empire. We have taught the world that whenever or wherever the prestige or integrity of Great Britain is assailed and the Lion calls for assistance—

"One by one through the vastness of the world the Lion answer him."

Well might Lord Salisbury refer with pride and satisfaction to the loyal devotion of "our kinsmen." Possessing the hearty endorsement and loyal support of her colonies, Great Britain may continue to treat with indifference the jealous mutterings of her European rivals.

Another, Wingham, where Premier Ross spoke, increased its majority adverse to Mr. Garrow from 11 to 72. It was upon four divisions that the skilled workers were concentrated. In Goderich Garrow's majority of 1 in 1898 was lifted to 131. In Clinton his majority of 11 blossomed forth into 79. In Goderich town-ship the Conservative majority was cut down from 123 to 94, while in Colborne township the Conservative majority of 38 was changed into a machine majority of 36. It was in these four places that the skilled men were active.
