The patient was a girl, twenty-two years of age. She suffered from some affection that may have been meningitis, but this is not known positively. She then developed acute maniacal excitation. During this illness the patient presented some remarkable tient presented some remarkable changes of personality—such as are changes of personality—such as are seen in hysteria.
