"A Statesman of the Colonial Era," by General Richard Taylor, describes the career of George Mason, of Virginia, and attributes to that gentleman many sayings and writings that have hitherto been credited to other men. Hon. D. H. Chamberlain writes on "Reconstruction and the Negro," and presents the results of his experiences and observations while occupying the gubernatorial chair in South Carolina. "The Story of the Discontented of the Russian rule, and of the influence at work to overthrow the government," by a prominent leader of the insurrectionists. "The Scientific Work of the Huxtable Expedition," by O. T. Sherman, of the same name, gives a very full statement, and the only one that has been presented to the public, of the scientific results of the recent government expedition to the Arctic polar seas. "Sensationalism in the Pulpit," by Rev. Dr. Taylor, of the Broadway Tabernacle, New York, is a pungent criticism of the modern tendencies of certain preachers. The number closes with an article by Professor T. F. Crane on "Medieval French Literature," by a revision of the class books known to but few readers in this country. 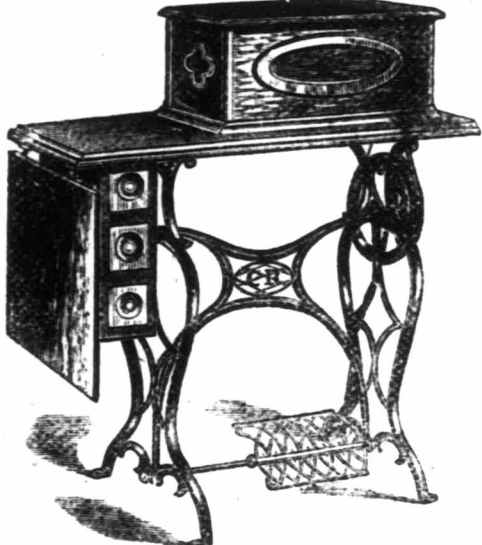
