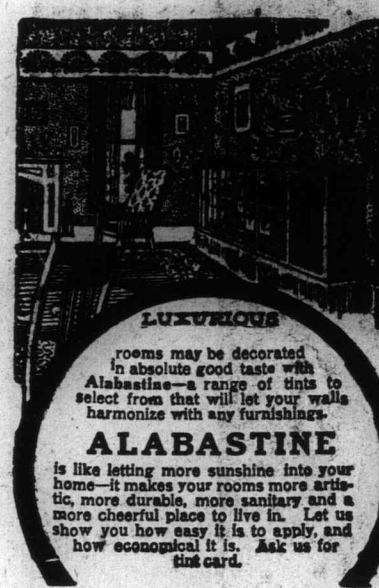

The evil habit of going too long without food is one from which many people suffer at this present age. Men sit in their offices, women rush about shopping, and becoming so absorbed in their respective interests that the period of hunger is allowed to pass, and that of fatigue and depression to set in. The worst feature of such cases is, that once the second stage is reached, the desire for food is gone; and after this treatment, a one's self the stomach is too exhausted to digest a meal when taken; all persons should avoid this extreme. It is only necessary to take light and rapidly eaten diet—a glass of milk, a biscuit will do to prevent after loss of appetite. And yet those who call themselves sensible prefer to ruin their health rather than take the time and trouble to run into a restaurant and drink a glass of milk.

"What fools these mortals be!"

The crowned heads of Europe will hardly feel flattered by the action of the Kaiser in depicting them or their relatives on a pack of playing cards, which recently he has designed, it is said. The queen of hearts shows the portrait of Queen Victoria, who was the Kaiser's grandmother. The dowager queen of Italy is the queen of diamonds, the late Empress Elizabeth of Austria the queen of clubs, and the Czarina the queen of spades. Pope Leo XIII. is the king of spades, the late king Humbert the king of clubs, Leopold of Belgium the king of diamonds, while the Kaiser himself will appear as the king of hearts. The Kaiser has allotted the features of Bismarck, Gladstone, Crispin, Waldeck-Rousseau to the four knaves.

To "Frau Krupp" belongs the reputation of being the richest person in Germany, and according to some authorities the wealthiest of taxpayers is also a woman. Mme. Lebaudy, mother of Jacques, Emperor of Siam, is believed to be worth at least \$40,000,000. She holds her wealth in horror and lives under an assumed name in order to avoid publicity. Her residence all the year round is a small flat in Versailles, where the domestic staff consists of one servant who is assisted in the work by her mistress.

Mme. Lebaudy gives very nearly the whole of her income, most of her donations being bestowed anonymously. It is an open secret however that for many years past she has made up the annual deficit of the leading French royalist paper, which usually amounts to about \$50,000. There are at least two American women with even larger fortunes than Frau Krupp. Mrs. E. A. Harriman controls but little less.

A course of lectures with practical demonstrations will be given under the auspices of the Austrian Dendrological Society, in Vienna this spring for women. Instruction in poultry farming, agriculture and various branches of gardening will be given.

A new occupation for women is the arrangement of window boxes and

balconies in flats, which are filled with flowering trees, plants and creepers. The arrangement requires much taste and is a somewhat long job, as great care must be taken in securing the pots. Another branch is the care of plants kept in the house, which is quite an art in itself, and which, with table decoration is another line which women, attached to florists, or nurseries, may adopt with advantage.
