The Canadian shipper of wheat, for example, sells his bill against the consignee in London at the rate of exchange prevailing in New York. he gets £1,000 for a shipment wheat he takes the bill in London to nis bank and receives the money in dollars at the prevailing rate above par-\$4.86 2-3 to the pound sterling.

But recently exchange has been very far from par, going down to almost a record low point of \$4.50 a short time ago.
