UNITED STATES TARIFF

In one particular item only, does the bill presented to Congress of like reciprocal action by other countries, if advantage is to be taken of the terms of the proposed duty, and that relates to wheat flour, which is made free, but provides a duty of 10 per cent, against countries which levy a duty on United States flour. This is a concession to American milling interests, which did not object to free wheat, but opposed free flour. President Wilson has given proof of sincerity of purpose and action, but the very radicalism of his work has astonished the nation. There is an outcry from the great manufacturing industries, and evidence that the bill, if it passes, will become a law only after bitter opposition.

The work of the ways and means committee of the United States Congress has been thorough. The new bill is radical. Nothing comparable is recalled since a bill introduced in the early days of the Cleveland administration, and even that bill preserved for duty products on which the present bill lays violent hands. There is a huge sacrifice of revenue, but this loss to the treasury will be made by income tax receipts. Without that revenue the new tariff would operate at a positive financial detriment.

The changes proposed by the tariff bill are of unusual interest to Canadians. The duty on wheat, oats and barley has been heavily cut. Dairy products, cheese, butter, and cream, eggs, and vegetables, apples and peaches, are subject to substantial reductions. Meats, boots and shoes, lumber, coal and a long list of other articles are made duty free. Some of these articles are exported from Canada. Most of them, even under free entry to the American markets, will make little impression on international trade conditions.

It must be borne in mind that President Wilson, and the ways and means Committee had for their avowed purpose in so violently slashing the tariff duties, the benefits, which it was claimed the United States consumers would derive from an extended free list, and a substantial reduction in the dutiable list. The people of the United States have been told that the tariff was responsible for high prices, and that the only relief from these high prices was to be found in a sweeping reversal of the fiscal policy to which the Republican party was committed from its earliest period of governmental control. It was one of the favorite arguments of the reciprocity advocates in Canada, in 1911, that throwing open the United States market would stimulate prices for the Canadian producers. Practically very consideration which was sought under that reciprocity agreement is now extended to Canada under the new tariff bill. If the arguments of the reciprocity advocates are economically sound, there should be a substantial rise in the price of every article which Canada exports and which is included in the reductions embraced in the new tariff. The grain grower of the West should be pleased, if his arguments of 1911 were sound. The exporter of dairy products and fruits should also benefit. We are however going to prophesy the predictions, that instead of any such increase, the result of this tariff slashing by the new economic leaders, headed by a college president, will have the result of depressing prices in the American markets. If that result is not reached, then the work of President Wilson and his advisers comes to naught. If competition does not lower prices to the consumer, the absurdity of trying to reduce the cost of living by inviting it is apparent and palpable. If Canada gets better prices, as we were told she would, in 1911, then how is the cost of living to be reduced by the new American tariff bill?

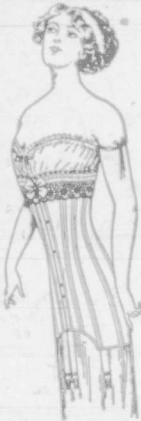
The body of Miss Agnes L. Brown, of Hantsport was taken to Middleton on Saturday week for burial.
