Killed

Trinidad, Oct. 5.—Seven miners, including Superintendent Alexander Jacobs, were burned or suffocated Sunday night at the Engleville mine, at Engleville, Col.

The bodies were recovered yesterday. The men went to work Sunday night, and when they did not come out yesterday morning an investigation was started. It was discovered that fire, which broke out in the mine a year ago, suddenly spread and swept across the incline tunnel preventing the men from reaching the outside.

The point where the flames crossed the tunnel is three miles from the mine, and it was necessary to dig a temporary tunnel around to reach the dead bodies.

JACOBS' VISIT PAYS

Orders Amounting to \$12,000,000 Placed With U. S. Firms.

New York, May 31.—Simultaneous with the presence of Gen. Kuroki in New York, the Japanese Government has placed in this country, mostly through New York City agencies, \$12,000,000 of orders for equipment for the South Manchurian Railway.

The orders include 1,300 miles of sparsely settled territory, 15 to be completed in the next two years, which will be record-breaking.

To ensure quick delivery, Japan has bought 100,000 tons of rails from Carnegie mills for \$28.50 a ton, considerably above the market price. Another order of 12,000 tons was placed at \$28.

Other orders are pushed aside to runk the rails to the Japanese. One order concerns the recovery of 10,000,000 freight trucks. The order
