



Bialistok, Russia, June 15 .- A Jew-Bialistok, Russia, June 15.—A Jewish anarchist threw a bomb among
the Corpus Christi procession which
was in progress here yesterday and
killed or wounded many persons.
In consequence the Christians attacked and massacred the Jews and
demolished their shops.
Hundreds of persons were killed or
wounded.

The bomb was thrown from the bal-The bomb was thrown from the balcony of a house in Alexandrova street. A Russian clergyman named Fedoroff was among the killed by the explosion. After the explosion the Jews began to fire with revolvers from the windows of the house into the crowd. Soldiers surrounded the house and fired two volleys into the windows.

Meanwhile the exasperated Christians attacked the Jewish stores in Alexandrova and Suraz streets, demolishing the fixtures and windows and throwing the goods into the gutters and beating and murdering the Jews.

The Outbreaks Planned.

St. Petersburg, June 15.—(2.15 a.m.)

Given Over to Slaughter.

Several members of Parliament last night received messages from Jewish correspondents at Bialistok, declaring that the police apparently had given over the Hebrew population to slaughter and pillage. These correspondents urged that the only hope was in an appeal to the Ministry of the Interior to interfere in their behalf. A delegation of deputies immediately called at the headquarters of the police department, headquarters of the police department, where they were informed that all measures possible had been taken to stop excesses and restore order.
