Bombs Oppose Cannon in Desperare Street Fighting.

Wounded Are Said to Number 14,000 -Artilery Used to Batter Down Houses Where Revolutionaries Are Barricaded - Program to Encircle Troops In Heart of City-Atrocities Committed Are Those of Madmen

St. Petersburg, Dec. 26.—Direct tele graphic communication with Moscow was severed Sunday night, but the Government succeeded in restoring communication by a roundabout route

yesterday morning.

All reports agree that the fighting Sunday, which continued until midnight, assumed the nature of a butchery by the machine guns of the artillery, grape and canister being employed mercilessly against the ill-armed insurgants

Atroclous tales are told of the Cossacks, who, plied with vodka until drunk, fired down the streets, sometimes charging with lances.

The insurgents displayed great stub-The insurgents displayed great stub-bornness in holding their parricaces, even advancing in a mass to the slaughter. At the same time the bombs were thrown from the windows of house's near the barricades occupied by the revolutionaries. The artillery was summoned and battered the

houses to piece The plan of the insurgents, it is stated, is to hold the outskirts and gradually enclose the troops in the

entre of the city. Leaders announce that an army 30,000 is concentrated at Orechoffsuef, northeast of Moscow, and will soon be ready to march to the city's assist-

The latest report is that both side were exhausted at midnight, when firing practically ceased.

The streets were in absolute darkness, save for searchlights in the towers of the bivouacs behind barri-5,000 Killed; 14,000 Wounded.

The driving force behind both the troops and the rebels is no longer that of enthusiasm or of any human

It is the fury of superhuman hate and hence the deeds reported are not acts of patriots, soldiers or otherwise but the enormities of madmen. "For every barricade destroyed Sun-day, two or three appeared in other places. Orders were given by the re-volutionists to shoot only when there was great hope of bringing a man down, but otherwise to tire out the

troops until they lost patience.
Loyalty of the Troops. "The most surprising thing of all is the loyalty of the troops, which no-body here anticipated

or anticipated.
"Talking with an intelligent group of St. Petersburg revolutionists I was informed that while they believed the strike would be victorious, they fully realized, they were staking everything upon the issue, and that failure would set back their cause for several years. They said they were devoting their efforts to shaking the foundations of Russian finance in full confidence that once the existing regime was over-thrown, they could as quickly build another and that foreign nations would be as ready to advance money to a democratic republic as to the

"in conclusion they declared that in event of failure of their cause they would have recourse to terrorism, choosing their victims from all classes of society."
