The father of the young men pleaded earnestly for leniency, which Mr. McKellar promised to give, stipulating, however, that restitution in full be made.

IMPORTING ALIEN LABOR.

Another Case Finds Its Way to the Legal Boneyard.

Toronto, Oct. 20.—Another alien labor action found its way to the legal boneyard yesterday morning when the case of Spittal v. Breckenridge was dismissed by the Divisional Court. Frank E. Breckenridge, general agent of the International Harvester Co., was alleged to have imported E. L. Spittal, an alien, to work in his office. A conviction was made by Magistrate O'Keefe of Ottawa, who fined the defendant \$50. A stated case was sent to the Divisional Court, and yesterday morning they quashed the conviction on purely technical grounds.

It is necessary before prosecuting under the alien labor law to get the consent of the Attorney-General or of a County Judge. In this case Judge O'Meara gave his consent, but did not stipulate any of the particulars under which the prosecution was being made. Chief Justice Meredith, Justices Anglin and Clute all agreed that something more than the formal consent was necessary, and that County Judge must specify the charges under which a prosecution is to be made.

CANADIAN CHEESE.

Cheshire Farmers Think That Importations Will Be Lessened.

London, Oct. 20.—(G. A. P.)—At the Chester Show of the Cheshire Dairy Farmers' Association, John Emberton, chairman, said he had been informed that this year customers who had previously used imported Canadian cheese had been using Cheshire cheese more freely than ever before. Mr. Chaloner, the secretary, said the Canadians had made up their minds not to send cheese to England unless it paid them to do so. As soon as cheese in Canada went below a certain price farmers stopped cheese-making. He did not think that in future Cheshire farmers would have the same competition to meet from Canada they had in bygone days.

PRINCE OF WALES FOR INDIA.

Will Spend the Winter in That Far Off British Dependency.

London, Oct. 20.—The Prince and Princess of Wales started on their six months' tour of India yesterday. King Edward, Queen Alexandra, the other members of the royal family and the Canadian Ministers were in their farewell at the railroad station.

The Prince and Princess of Wales are going overland to Genoa, Italy, where they will embark on the British battleship Renown, which is due to arrive at Bombay Nov. 2. They will stay in India until March, visiting the principal cities and native states.

THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

First Polling Day in New Canadian Province of Alberta.
Calgary, Alberta, Oct. 20.—The writs for the first election in the new Province of Alberta were issued last night. They call for Nominations Oct. 31, Elections Nov. 9.

The date of polling is, curiously enough, the King's Birthday.

The Fight in Saskatchewan.
Regina, Oct. 20.—The campaigns in Alberta and Saskatchewan are now being vigorously carried on. Both sides profess confidence and are concentrating every effort.

Quebec Honors Mr. Parent.
Quebec, Oct. 20.—The banquet given by the citizens of Quebec to ex-Premier Parent last evening at the Chateau Frontenac was a brilliant success. It was a non-political function, at the tables being seated both Liberals and Conservatives. Among those present were Lieut.-Governor Jetté, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, and Hon. R. Lemieux. The toasts were to "The King," "Our Guest," "Canada," and "Commerce and Transportation." All the speakers avoided everything of a political or partisan nature.

Joseph Murphy & Co. plays "Kerry Gow" here on Monday next.

There is an enjoyable element throughout the production: "Kerry Gow" is a rich study of character types. If a word of dialogue was not uttered throughout the four acts the audience would be admirably entertained in the study of characters in the cast. As Dan O'Hara, the blacksmith, Mr. Murphy is at his best, he seems to realize that there are people in the audience who have not been inside a theatre for years or since he appeared at the house perhaps years before, and he also realizes that there are others present who used to sit in the gallery in the old days and swear by him for so much sincerity that it is commendative. The audience is moved by his impetuous Irish wit. It is swayed by his confidence and entertained by his actions. The part which he plays is much younger in years than he is, but this is not noticed in his work, and he is to all appearances as clever now as he ever was.
