

## THE HOLIDAY HERE.

Beautiful Weather and Lots of Amusement Contributed to a Day of Rare Pleasure.

The national holiday, the first Dominion Day of the new century, passed off pleasantly though somewhat quietly here. The weather was perfect for out door enjoyment, business and labor was generally suspended and the various amusements were generously patronized, and crowds of citizens spent the day in the country which has almost irresistible attractions at this season. A large excursion party from St. John arrived here on the steamer Victoria shortly after dinner with a fine band, and the many visitors and the music enlivened the scene and contributed to the enjoyments of the afternoon.

### THE YACHT RACE.

Interest of many was centred in the yacht race, the first of a series of regattas. The trophy presented by Mr. J. Morrison of Toronto. There was a spanking breeze from the North-east with frequent heavy puffs which impelled the yachts to carry shortened sail and required the most watchful attention on the part of the yachtsmen.

Six boats started in the race, getting off fairly well together, they being known as Athore, Shute's Summer, McManus' Vera, Atherton's Doreen, Simmon's Cygnets and Vandine's Doreen. The lower buoy had been carried away and just before the start the judges gave instructions to the yachts to go down about the usual distance for the skipper of the leading yacht to choose some turning mark and for all the other boats to round the same point. The Vera led by a couple of hundred yards at the turn and when she came about all the other yachts did likewise, thus practically putting Vera out of the race.

The Lark gained steadily on the boat in the lead and was a good hundred yards ahead at the upper buoy. The Athore and Summer Girl got into a fix up in rounding the buoy in which the latter boat was capsized. The men hung to her and got her alongside a lot of logs near by, righted her and finished the race. The Lark increased her lead every minute of the run to the finish line, the weather just suiting her and her owner and sailor. The Athore finished second and Doreen third.

The officials of the race were: Starter, Harry Rutter; Timers, H. Rutter, D. J. Stockford; Judges, A. W. Edgecombe, R. P. Foster, E. Mullin; Referee, R. S. Barker. The official time of the three leaders was: Lark, 1 hr. 31 min. 35 sec.; Athore, 1 hr. 32 min. 15 sec.; Doreen, 1 hr. 31 min. 45 sec.

### THE HORSE RACE.

About 400 people assembled at the Trotting Park yesterday afternoon to witness the race between the four local horses. The race was made some time ago by the owner of each horse putting up \$10 in the hands of a stakeholder, and the day fixed upon to decide the fastest horse was July 1st. Precisely at 3 o'clock the judges

called the horses up, and they appeared as follows:—

Rosa Wilkes owned and driven by Harvey McCoy.

Groceryman owned by H. C. Jewett and driven by F. J. McCoy.

Harry L. owned by Wm. Lindsay and driven by Sandy Stewart.

Sligo owned and driven by Bert List.

Harry was given the pole. Sligo second position, Rosa third and the fruit representative on the outside. In this order they were sent away to what proved a funeral procession from start to finish, for Rosa at the word took the lead and kept it to the finish. Harry second, Sligo third, Groceryman fourth. Time 1.15.

In the second heat Rosa broke at the first turn, and Harry and Sligo both went up and passed her, but they did not stay long as the mare soon overtook and passed them with a rush of speed that really looked like a 20 shot finishing first again, Harry, second, Sligo, third. Time 1.18.

The last heat was all Rosa's and she won it in 1.10, Sligo 2nd, Harry 3rd.
