The dominion has power to enact the imposition of a general license upon all persons fishing, but such licenses cannot be restricted to any par-ticular lake, river, or other water. In the case of public harbors, the judg-ment of the supreme court in the case of Holman vs. Green is recognized, the lands thereof belonging to the dominion and as a consequence the right of fishing therein also belongs to the dominion. The domin-ton has also control of waters upon the Indian reserves. The dominion has no power to grant a lease, that is covering a certain area of water for fishing in any parts of the dominion.
