### CANADIAN FAILURES-

Insolvencies in the Dominion of Canada during April, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., were 102 in number and \$646,193 in amount of defaulted indebtedness. This statement makes a favorable comparison with the 116 failures for \$1,191,981 in the same month last year, and the total liabilities were also smaller than in 1907, although in number defaults were somewhat heavier. ber defaults were somewhat heavier. Manufacturing suspensions provided most of the decrease from the figures most of the decrease from the figures for a year ago, 24 failures involving \$117.311 comparing with 28 for \$569,179, while trading defaults were 75 in number and \$519.132 in amount, against \$6 for \$593.002 in 1908. There were three other commercial failures, against two last year, but liabilities of only \$9,750 compared with \$29,200 a year ago.
