

# MARKETS AND FINANCE

## TORONTO MARKETS

### LIVE STOCK.

The railways reported 90 cars loaded at the city market, consisting of 1,150 cattle, 1,228 hogs, 131 sheep and lambs, and 323 calves.

There were several loads of choice export and butcher cattle, as good as has been seen for some time on this market. Trade was generally good in all classes, with little change in quotations.

Exporters—Export steers sold from \$5.50 to \$6.12 1/2, one load being sold by Maybue & Wilson to the Harris Abattoir Co. at the latter figure; bulls sold at \$4.40 to \$5.

Butchers—One choice load of 16 butchers, 1,200 lbs. each, were sold by Maybue & Wilson at \$5.75, but the general run of best lots was from \$5.25 to \$5.50, and there were not a large number at these quotations; medium, \$4.90 to \$5.15; common, \$4.50 to \$4.80; cows, \$3.25 to \$4.75; inferior light butchers' steers and heifers, \$3.25 to \$4.25.

Milkers and Springers—Prices ranged from \$30 to \$70 each, Dunn & Leavack having sold one cow of extra quality at the latter price, but the bulk of the best cows ranged from \$50 to \$65 each. McDonald & Halligan sold at an average of \$55 each.

Veal Calves—Receipts liberal, market steady, at \$3 to \$5.50 for the bulk; a few of the best were reported at \$6 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs—Export sales at \$4.50 to \$5.50; rams, \$3.50 to \$4.50; yearling lambs, grain fed, \$7 to \$7.75; common yearlings, \$5 to \$6 per cwt.; spring lambs, \$3 to \$6 each.

Hogs—Mr. Harris reported select hogs, fed and watered at the market, at \$7.40, and \$7.15 f. o. b. cars at country points.

FARMERS' MARKET.

The offerings of grain continue very light. Wheat firm, one load of fall selling at \$1.21 a bushel, and one load of goose at \$1.15. Rye sold at 75c for one load.

Hay in fair receipt, with prices steady. 30 loads sold at \$14 to \$15.50 a ton for No. 1, and at \$10 to \$12 for No. 2. One load of straw sold at \$14 a ton.

Dressed hogs are first, \$6.75 to \$10, for heavy, and at \$10.25 to \$10.40 for light.

London—The wool auction sales opened to-day with a large attendance of buyers, including many American. There were strong demands for all selections offered. Cross breeds fine sold 5s 5d; coarse, 5s 1-2 per cent, dearer. Medium sold 10 per cent, over the previous sales. Cape of Good Hope and Natal stock showed an advance of 7-12 per cent. The total offerings to-day were 11,670 bales; scored, 1s 3d to 1s 6d; Queensland, 500 bales; scored, 1s 4-12d to 1s 8-12d; greasy, 3d to 1s; West Australia, 200 bales, greasy, 5d to 9-12d; New Zealand, 7,000 bales; scored, 11d to 1s 6-12d; greasy, 6d to 1s 2d. Cape of Good Hope and Natal, 100 bales; greasy, 5-14d to 9-12d; Merino, 3,700 bales; greasy, 6d to 1s.

### REDUCTION IN PRICE OF OIL.

Pittsburg—A reduction of five cents a barrel was announced to-day by the Standard Oil Company in the price of all grades of crude oil except Ragland, which is unchanged.

This is the first change in the Pennsylvania and most of the other grades, since March 9, 1907, since which time the Pennsylvania crude has been quoted constantly at \$1.78.

The prices effective at 10 o'clock this morning are: Pennsylvania, \$1.73; Merino, \$1.30; Newcastle, \$1.17; Corn, \$1.09; Cabell, \$1.27; North Lima, 99c; South Lima, 94c; Indiana, 94c; Somerset, 85c; Ragland, 80c; Canada, \$1.25.
