In the Balance

Women and The War

"Everybody is preaching economy just now," writes a London correspondent, "and if I buy new gloves or indulge in the dizzy delights of a spring hat, I feel as if I were engaging in some illicit pleasure that should not be acknowledged to anyone outside my immediate family circle. And yet when I looked in at the historic auction rooms of Christie's in King street St. James, the other day, I found that silver toilet services of the Restoration period were being sold at \$5,000 and upwards."

There seems to be a special run on these wonderful old toilet services among rich collectors just at present. I must say it made me feel quite uncomfortable to hear the bidding at Christie's soar up to \$70,000 on the same day. As I looked at the amazing collection of pounce boxes, scent bottles, powder puff boxes, boxes for cosmetics, candlesticks, and brushes and combs that were made two or three hundred years ago for the mistresses of a king, I felt a certain grudge against that long-dead beauty and thought of the wartime sermons that are being preached and written everywhere just now on the subject of "unnecessary expenditure."

I was going along Regent street in a useful and democratic motor omnibus one day last week when no less a person than the mother-in-law of Mr. H. G. Wells, mounted the same vehicle. I don't know why a mother-in-law is regarded by the public generally as a huge joke, and by the individual as a tragic blunder, but there it is. Mr. Wells' mother-in-law and I were seated side by side, and as we happened to know each other, we conversed. She is a very small and determined looking lady, who I fear or has leanings towards the peace party. Unlike "Mr. Bunting" I don't believe she wants to "see it through" except in a finished sense.

Mr. Wells' mother-in-law belongs to a very famous women's club called the Lyceum, which exists, in spite of the war, in Piccadilly. It is one of the few women's clubs in London that possesses a billiard room, the very surprise instead of talking about the war, as is usually done when you meet acquaintances by chance in London nowadays, we began to talk about billiards. I discovered that even now there is a group of ladies who play billiards and have billiard tournaments, and indulge in pool, and "snooker," just as they used to do in the good old ante-bellum days when it was rather "the smart thing" for a woman to adjourn to the club with a friend and have "a hundred up after lunch."

And another aspect of war times has been brought home to me during the present week. I was talking to the manager of a huge department store concerning various business matters, and I chanced to remark upon the smart appearance of the various young women finding positions in the huge establishment. "I suppose they say with you for years," I remarked, and his answer surprised me.

Hard to Keep Girls
"Not since the war," he said. "I have the greatest difficulty not only in securing girls, but also in keeping them here, owing to the enormous number of unattached young men swarming through London. Some of them are stationed in or near town with their regiments, others passing to and fro continually. I find it trou-

blesome to harness these young women to ordinary business life. One or other of them attracts the attention of some enterprising officer with a fair amount of money. She is offered the usual lure of a charming home, pretty clothes and a good time generally, and before you can think she has left the situation, and the establishment is minus a helping hand."

"It is a strange but true psychological fact that English girls, filling more or less subordinate positions in stores, cannot be brought to see the necessity of looking to the future. A Parisian shop girl has her amours, but she seldom allows them to affect her everyday business life. She attends to her 'common toll' each day and then becomes a butterfly in her leisure hours. The English girl with no special initiative, is apt to become simply a rather lazy young animal, content to live in the fullness of today and thinking but little of what may occur on the morrow. Of course, I am speaking of only a certain type and class of English girl, for the great majority of them have proved the magnificence of their independent efforts during the past three years."

Now that people mostly carry their own parcels and packages home from shops when possible, all sorts of funny mistakes are apt to occur. One of the best stories I have heard apropos of this state of affairs has been told to me concerning a couple of officers of the Royal Flying Corps who were dining at a West End restaurant. They had been making some purchases during the afternoon and left the parcel (containing shirts, socks and other masculine necessities) in the cloak room. After dinner they secured their coats and hats and returned to their suburban home. I forgot to mention that they were married to sisters and were spending their leave within the bosom of their joint mother-in-law's household. When they arrived home the package was brought out to be unpacked so that each man could secure his own personal property. The busy wives untied the strings and opened the box and discovered sets of crepe-de-chine undergarments that were certainly never intended for a man to gaze upon except in the sacred privacy of the conjugal bedroom!

Of course, the very worst construction was put on the whole affair and the two wives, being in the magnificently fortified position of their own family circle, won complete victory over the spiritless foe. It was at last established that neither of the gallant officers of the Royal Flying Corps was actually responsible for the purchase of the lingerie, but no solemn oaths could make the wives believe the story (which happened to be perfectly true) that they had dined alone on that fatal evening when the parcels got mixed up.

But another side almost equally eloquent in surmise may also be developed along this same true tale. What did the ladies or the lady do who happened to get the parcel belonging to the officers? Was she suspected and denounced by a rightly suspicious husband when a box containing khaki shirts, linen collars and woolen socks was opened in the seclusion of the home? Tragedy might lie in the trail of such stories, but it is difficult to regard them without their element of humor.

Homeseekers' tickets reading via Canadian Government Railways through Quebec will be good for stop-over at Stations, Doucet, Que., Hearst, Ont., and intermediate points, while tickets routed via "Transcontinental Line" will permit stop-over at Cochrane, Ont., Hearst, Que., and intermediate stations, with the additional privilege of sidetrip tickets (if desired) from Cochrane to Canadian Government Railway Stations each thereof, to and including Doucet, Que., at special low fare.

The above stop-over and side-trip privileges are arranged in order to enable passengers for western points to inspect the famous "Clay Belt" of Quebec and New Ontario—a rich farm country opened up by the new line of the Canadian Government Railways. CHATHAM, ONT., SELLS FOOD AT COST

Chatham, Ont., May 31—The Civic Purchasing Board is hitting the high cost of living these days. The board sold five tons of flour at \$5.10 a hundred, while the mills are quoting \$7.25. Nearly five hundred pounds of butter were sold at 37 cents a pound, while the market price was 42 to 45 cents. A carload of potatoes has been purchased, and is practically all sold at \$3.65 a bushel, as against market quotations of \$4.25 to \$4.75. So far the city has not been called upon to expend one nickel in the plan as cash is being paid for everything, and the committee is just turning over the money received from national. There is no delivery or other overhead cost, and sales are being made at actual cost.

Forest fires raging all through the organized and unorganized districts around Port William and Port Arthur are destroying large areas of timber and uncut pulpwood.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. Deputy of the Minister of the Interior N. B.—Unauthorized publication of this advertisement will not be paid for.
