ITALIAN TROOPS LAND AT ZARA AND SIBENICO CITIES

RETURNED OFFICERS DEMAND THAT IRISHMAN BE KEPT OUT

ALLEGED STATEMENT BY IRISH MINISTER ON SHIPBOARD MAKES CANADIAN FIGHTING MEN HOT UNDER THE COLLAR—WANT HIM STOPPED FROM ENTERING CANADA.

Halifax, N. S., May 15.—Heated arguments on Irish affairs on board the Royal George during her trip from Liverpool to this port caused a number of Canadian officers to demand that Brother Thomas A. Rahilly, of Cork, Ireland, be not admitted to Canada.

Today when the ship docked officers protested against Brother Rahilly's presence in Canada and stated that he rendered himself generally obnoxious throughout the trip. On one occasion, they said, in the heat of an argument in the smoking saloon, he announced that he was coming to Canada for the purpose of spreading Sinn Fein doctrines among the French-Canadian people.

Brother Rahilly said he had founded schools in Montreal and elsewhere in Canada in 1917, at the earnest request of the French-Canadian population, which felt that there were not sufficient facilities in the country for the teaching of their children in the French language.

Brother Rahilly stated that he had been to Ireland during the voyage and had stood with the others on one occasion and on another had left the room before the opening bars. What he had stated in private conversation during the voyage was public property in Ireland.

Seventy-six per cent. of the population of Ireland are enslaved, said Brother Rahilly. "They have to wait between barriers of fixed bayonet when they wish to go anywhere. I would prefer not being a slave. A man for the Sinn Fein party, it is nothing more than the old National Party under a new name."

CELTIC NEARS PORT WITH 2,675 SOLDIERS

Ottawa, May 15.—The militia Department has been advised that the transport Celtic, with 2,675 Canadian troops on board, will arrive in Halifax on or about May 15. She has drafts for every dispersal area in Canada, but no units are reported.

SHIPPARDS TROUBLE IS NOW ABOUT OVER
