Mexico City, Mexico, May 29.—El Diario de La Tarde in its last edition this evening prints a special message from the border to Tuxtila Guiterez, which says that Guatemalan troops are throwing up entrenchments and mounting artillery opposite the town of Oces. This information cannot at this time be officially confirmed, the government knowing nothing of the incident. The special message follows: "Tuxtilla Guiterex, We have just received in this city a message from the Tapachula which says, 'The Guatemalan forces are actively throwing up entrenchments and conducting fortifications on the line opposite Oces.
