In Dying Condition.

Henry Shimmers Found Yesterday Paralyzed in Shack.

Yesterday afternoon Harry Shimmers, an old man, who is well known all over St. John's, was discovered in a shack at the Look Out inside Mundy's Pond, by a man named Mercer who lived some distance from him. He was in an almost dying condition. Mercer travelled to the city and reported the matter at the Police Station when Supr. Grimes despatched Constables Tucker and Crocker with an express to bring the unfortunate man to the city. The officers accompanied by Mr. Mercer went to the man's humble abode and found him in a miserable condition. The poor fellow lay on an apology for a bed covered with a few old brin bags. He had evidently suffered from a stroke of paralysis, but when he was stricken it was impossible to determine. He has been living in the hut in which he was found, alone for some time past, and he could barely articulate when the officers went in to his humble abode. He was a very sick man, and the kind hearted policemen gave him every attention, tenderly lifted him to the vehicle and drove him to the lock-up where Dr. Cowperthwaite was called to see him, and after affording him necessary aid ordered him to hospital where he was taken in the ambulance. It is feared that the man, who is upwards of 70 years of age, and who is wasted by disease and privation, cannot live. Shimmers was a hardy man in his day, was intelligent and hard working, and the man who knows him will be sorry to hear of his condition. Some ten or twelve years ago when smallpox became epidemic in the city he was one of the first to be afflicted with it in his residence in Dummerill's Lane, and his was one of the worst cases which occurred at that time. For many years, in early life, he resided at English Cove, a small place situated between the Districts of Brigus and Harbor Main.

At the Quarterly meeting of the Total Abstinence Society, held on yesterday afternoon, it was decided to celebrate in a fitting manner the Anniversary of Rev. Father Matthews' birth, Oct. 10th, by holding an "At Home," free to members and their lady friends, in their spacious hall. A committee of twelve was selected to attend to all details. Fifteen applicants for admission were made happy by being accepted as members. They are fully determined to oppose the demon of strong drink for ever more. President Ellis congratulated them and trusted that they would always uphold the glorious principles of Total Abstinence. Rev. Dr. Kitchen, Spiritual Director, delivered an appropriate discourse on "Education," and in plain and simple language poured out to the large gathering assembled the duties of parents, and earnestly entreated them to see that their children were kept at school and exhorted them to give particular attention in their home lessons. Secretary Coughlan submitted the Quarterly report. It showed the society to be in good financial standing. Secretary Murphy presented the Juvenile Branch receipts and expenditure for the past quarter. This shows wonderful progress. Upwards of 35 boys have joined the ranks since June last and that the health of the society numbering over 400 boys, was most pleasing to all concerned, only one little tot being laid off for a short time.

Secy. Rolis, for Band Committee, reported on the excellent condition of the Society's Brass Band, which has progressed well under the tuition of Instructor N. F. Murphy. President Ellis informed the meeting that he had made inquiries about the Boat Club and that at next meeting that he would furnish all particulars regarding same and the same time intimated that the idea of having a new boat built for next year's regatta met with his hearty support.

Guards' Parade.

The Methodist Guards held their Anniversary parade yesterday marching from their Hall along LeMerchant Road and Long's Hill to Gower St. church where service was conducted by Rev. F. R. Matthews, Chaplain of the Brigade. There were 233 laid in the procession including 70 ex-members. The sermon was one that will long be remembered, being an eloquent course on the "Race of Christian Life." He referred to the fact that it was from a lack of faith in God, and the failure to follow christian principles that the great armies of the world became enervated and finally were conquered in past ages. He exhorted all the boys to live good lives modelled on Christian principles. After the sermon the lads returned to their armory by way of Water St. and Patrick St. and LeMerchant Road. The band played good music along the route. Before the corps disbanded Major Hutchings addressed the boys and congratulated them on their excellent appearance. He also announced that there would be a parade at 7.30 p.m. Thursday evening. They will march through the town to the College Hall where a dinner will be served in honor of the anniversary. Every member and ex-member is expected to attend.

Typhoid Prevalent.

By yesterday's express Dr. Brehm, the Medical Health Officer, left for Red Cliff Island, near Open Hill, Bonavista Bay. An outbreak of typhoid has occurred there and the disease is located in several houses, and a number of persons are ill of it. Some 4 or 5 years ago this same place, Red Cliff Island, was visited with the same disease, a large number of the people died and there was considerable suffering for months. The Health Authorities hope this time to stamp it out quickly and to avoid any undue loss of life.

Unusual Sight.

An unusual sight was witnessed last night at 11.30 o'clock on Military Road, near Rawlins' Cross. Two men with horse and long cart were seen coming eastwards. Attached to the cart by means of ropes were three young heifers. They became weak as they neared Rawlins' Cross, probably by having come a long distance hurriedly, that they fell to the ground exhausted. After a short rest the men got them on their legs again and proceeded in towards Rennie's Mill Road. In the opinion of those present it was a clear case of cruelty.
