At the City Hall.

The regular weekly meeting of the City Commissioners took place Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. All the members of the Board were present, and the following matters were disposed of:

Mr. J. J. St. John offered thirty cases of lubricating oil for street purposes. This could not be accepted as lubricating oil was not used on streets.

J. C. Pratt, on behalf of the committee preparing the Ayre Athletic Field on Pennywell Road, requested street line to erect fence. Ordered the line be given him for Lincoln's Lane, as previously adopted, and the City Engineer is to prepare a plan of Pennywell Road and submit it at the next meeting.

John Anderson, on behalf of the Dominion Co-operative Building Association, requested information as to the intentions of the Commissioners regarding the land known as the Nuns' Field. Ordered the City Engineer be asked to prepare plans of same.

R. Hibbs, Secretary Nfld. Road Commission, requested the Council to take steps to collect the balance of the tax due on motor cars. Ordered he be informed that notice has been given in the press calling on all parties liable under the Act passed last session. In connection with this matter the Commissioners want it to be plainly stated they were not parties to this new Act, and it was passed without their approval. It was a Government measure, solely.

The Trade Bakery requested an estimate of the cost of getting water connection from the city pipes for their bakery purposes. Ordered the City Engineer prepare an estimate of the cost.

Mr. P. Barry, Brazil's Square, applied for one of the houses proposed to be erected on Quidi Vidi Road. A similar application came from A. J. Donnelly, Duckworth St. Both applications were ordered to be placed on file.

The following plans of houses were approved, subject to the condition that in all cases water and sewerage must be installed before occupancy is allowed: Jas. Gush, Franklin Avenue; M. Ryan, Merrymeeting Rd.; Bella Stokes, Franklin Avenue; B. W. Mitchell, Franklin Avenue.

Tenders are to be called for 100 sacks of good white or mixed oats; also for 150 tons hay.

Sanitary Supervisor reported on the work of the Impounder for the season.

The plan of widening Waterford Bridge Road, submitted by the City Engineer, was ordered to be referred to the Public Works Department, as the property was outside city limits.

Plan of ground corner Patrick St., and LeMarchant Road, was ordered to be prepared for next meeting. Work on Pleasant Street would be done a little later.

It was ordered that \$1,000 be handed to the Health Officer according to estimates prepared early in the year. After several minor matters were dealt with, the meeting adjourned.

SICK OF IT.

The public life of this country needs purifying and that quickly and completely.

There must be an entire breaking away from the old parliamentarian with his corruptly conceived notion of buying up the electorate. An entirely new group of men must come to the rescue.

Where they are coming from is not so much the puzzle as how to keep them from the degrading influence of the old time parliamentarian, who bought his election by distributing public money.

It was believed that Premier Squires would lead the way to a less corruptible system, yet the dismissals and rewards handed out by his party have been an unblushing continuation of the old spoils system.

The country is sick to death of the whole foul business, but it knows not which way to turn for escape.

A HOAXED ELECTORATE.

There is said to be plenty of sugar in the country; and yet the price still goes upward, in spite of the fact that the control of sugar has been under the Government since the first of June.

Molasses is selling at two dollars

a gallon or over, and the people must buy something wherewith to add the necessary sweetness to certain articles of diet.

Last November we were promised a relief from the "profiteer" who was supposed to be at the bottom of high prices. What has been the net result?

The Food Control Board assumed the control of sugar, and immediately the price, which had been at a maximum of 28 and as low as 26, jumped to 32 cents a pound!

That was not bad for a starter; while a further increase has now been made, and even at that outport dealers say they will not handle sugar at the profit allowed the retailer. The whole situation appears to have been caused by an excellent piece of amateur bungling as one can well imagine, the Sugar Refiners having found our R. C. B. a bunch of "easy marks."

Then there was the Profiteering Act, passed a couple of months ago with much flag flapping on the part of the government organs.

Yet no profiteer has so far been haled to court, nor have prices on any article suffered any sudden decline—rather the reverse.

Evidently the meaning of it all is that the electorate was hoaxed—and badly hoaxed by as flagrant a bunch of profiteers as ever sat in the seats of the Assembly Room; for their final act of voting themselves increases of 500 per cent. in their salaries—indebitment is the pretty word they like to use—was the most outrageous piece of profiteering one can well conceive.
