### Priceless Books.

NOTABLE GIFTS TO THE WELSH

NATIONAL LIBRARY. Through the generosity of the Misses Davies, of Plasdinam, an addition has just been made to the National Library of Wales of four printed books and two manuscripts of exceptional value for their beauty and rarity. They formed part of the valuable Peniarth Library, but for family reasons were not included among the Peniarth manuscripts acquired some years ago by Sir John Williams, and given by him to the National Library. The four printed books include two by Caxton, one printed by his successor, Wynkyn de Worde, and a copy of the English Bible of 1539, printed on vellum. The two manuscripts are a passionale of the fifteenth century—it was probably prepared for King Henry VII.—on vellum, with 34 large and beautiful niniatures in gold and colours, and a fifteenth century manuscript conaining an English translation of the Distichs of Cato, "The Wars of Alexander the Great" (Latin), and "The Story of the Three Kings of Cologne"
