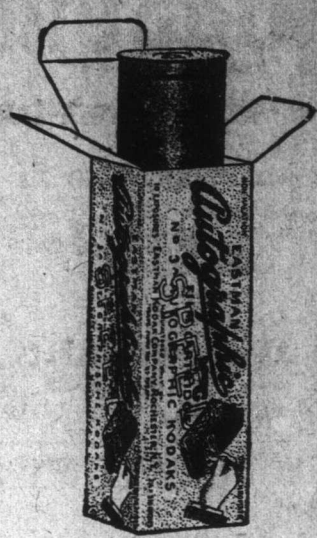

GOR SAVE THE KING.

The speeches were of a high order
and a most enjoyable evening was
spent. The Supreme President and
Secretary are visiting this country
this year. Lodge Diamond Jubilee was
born on May 25th, 1897, and
Mr. Simmons read the original Char-
ter, containing the names of the
Charter members.

Railway Troubles.

The reckoning day has truly come
between the Government and the
Reid Newfoundland Company, in the
question of the railway and steamship
system. The government has taken
a stand and cannot guarantee more
money to keep this business going,
so they claim. However, a hold-up is
now a reality and this handicaps both
parties, as all boats as well as all
trains are at a standstill, the Reids
refusing to pay their hands until the
question is settled.

It seems that all the trouble has
sprung from the branch railway propo-
sition inaugurated during the Morris
term and although warned by Sir R.

Bond, in words quoted by Mr. Walsh
in speaking on the Loan Resolutions,
who said he remembered being in the
House as a visitor when the branch
railways were being discussed, when
he heard Sir Robert Bond, who was
leading the Opposition at the time,
made the remark that

"the reckless expenditure of borrow-
ed millions is causing a temporary
shelter which must necessarily bring
disaster before long, and then we shall
feel the full blast of the storm." Yet
the policy was adopted merely be-
cause of a promise in a manifesto
which gave Sir E. P. Morris pull to
gain election. Yet the Reids, receiv-
ing \$15,000 per mile for construction
of these lines, were unable to run
them without help from the govern-
ment, and this help they seem to have
received up till now—the Squires ad-
ministration having to follow suit—
and a clash has come. We hope for
a peaceful settlement and one bene-
ficial to both the Reids and the Govern-
ment.

No doubt the Reid Nfd. Co. has had
losses and only for the aid of the gov-
ernment in the past they would not
have been able to carry on. Thus we
must place the blame where it be-
longs and that is undoubtedly in the
construction of branch lines in a not
very-well-to-do country. The Reids
are partly to blame for ever accepting
such a proposition even if the gov-
ernment guaranteed payments to
maintain the railway, and if the main
line had been kept from costly bran-
ching, the Coy. would have been bet-
ter financially and would have not had
such a heavy burden as is now laid-up-
on them. With a mail subsidy and a re-
gular rate for freight and passengers
as in days of old they would be able
from such fancy obligations and there
would not have been such a drain on
the wealth of Newfoundland.

Millions of money has gone to the
bad just for a petty party pull, when
aiming at honor and power, men have
sacrificed law and constitution. How
can any business prosper under gov-
ernment control. It has failed in

gain a little popularity and win over
their opponents, money is used as a
lever to buy their way which only
temporarily saves them, and when the
blast comes and their house built on
the sand, and a heap of rubbish—

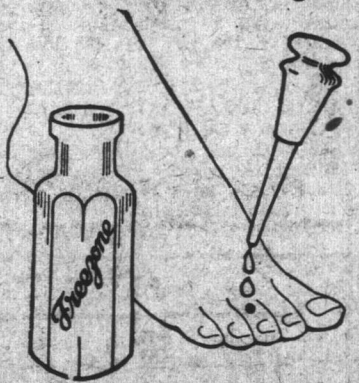
