STORME LAWYER THROUGH NIGHT WORK.

By the last mail news was received of the marriage on September 8th, of Mr. R. Goodland, LL. B., formerly of St. John's, son of the late W. H. Goodland, and brother of E. J. Goodland, of the Saturday Night Publishing Co., to Miss Helen Malley of Lynn, Mass. Goodland left St. John's some 12 years ago working as compositor with the Fort Hill Press, Boston, for two years. During that time he joined the National Athletic Association at Boston and took up wrestling, weight lifting having formerly been his specialty. In 1915 Mr. Goodland won the England Amateur Welterweight Championship, and the Clapp Memorial Medal at Weymouth, Mass., also competing at the San Francisco Exposition wrestling trials in the 145 pound class, winning in the finals, having victories to his credit while the champion had three only, but receiving the decision in the final bout owing to a fall being registered. (Mr. Nelson, the winner, has since held the professional championship in this class which speaks well for the Newfoundlander, runner-up.) Remaining home after the death of his father, the late W. H. Goodland, of the firm of Gray & Goodland, Mr. Goodland Jr. brought no less than seven cups obtained from wrestling which was one received from the University, as well as a number of medals and a beautiful gold watch given by the Masonic Fraternity for his wrestling bouts and beautifully engraved with the emblems of that organization. This was won by Mr. Goodland in open competition. Returning to St. John's, Mr. Goodland continued work in the printing business, but took up law in the evenings at the Night Department of The Northern University of Massachusetts and after four years' hard work passed the State examination, obtaining the degree of LL. B. Forty members of the University and out of five hundred and seventy-five entrants throughout the United States, only two hundred and fifteen were successful. The student who had to be sworn in on the 22nd inst. after which they will be eligible to practice law in the United States. Mr. W. R. Goodland, LL. B., was educated at the Knight St. School under Miss Rachael Bradbury of the Methodist College and at Bishop Field College under Dr. W. H. Hall to this early training he owes much of his present success. He was a member of the C. of C. Club, the C.L.B. and the Avalon Athletic Club. In 1910 he rowed in the Annual Regatta with the successful "Evening Herald's" crew of that year. His many friends and associates in this city will be pleased to hear of the successful career he is making in the land of Uncle Sam.
