This follows, of course, mainly from the fact that the proposition from a financial viewpoint is a most attractive one and will pay a certain and absolute eight per cent, with a profitable fat bonus on stock earnings, and offers attractions, that even the most careful investor would not care to let go by.

The point that we wish to make, nowever, it this: a big hotel to acomodate over 1,000 guests is a good thing for a Montreal medium in bringing in a flow of money from tourists, certainly a hotel proportionate to our own city-say one with 200 rooms, should bring to us some of the good financial results that the Montreal people anticipate—especially in tourist traffic.

We find our people are quite ready to put up money for a hotel in Quebec Province, but that they get "cold feet" when a scheme such as that is projected for St. John's, even though the local outlook for big dividends is equally as good.



The fish were of a large size and excellent in quality, and a few barrels that were brought home show that no fault could be found with them. The fishermen unfortunately were not provided with the means of packing what would have been a useful addition to the profit of their labors. Years ago Snug Harbor was one of the chief centres of the herring fishery, and cargoes were sent to Montreal and other markets every fall, the fishery proving a valuable one to the fishermen and the exporters. At present there is not a ready market for this highly edible fish, as the South and West Coast fisheries more than supply the demand. The Labrador herring is in a class by itself, and were the fish caught and marketed they probably would find a market that at present is non-existent.


