ENTHUSIASTIC REGATTA MEETING

Eighteen Crews Entered Last Night.
A largely attended meeting of the Regatta Committee was held in the T.A. Armouries last night with President Hiscock in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. Applications were read from G.L.B.C. and C.C.C. Boat Clubs, also the G.W.V.A., asking permission to operate wheels of fortune at the lake side, on day of Regatta. It was decided after careful consideration to grant permission to Boat Clubs only. A communication was read from the G.W.V.A. re two bills incurred by the Hair Regatta Committee for buoys and stands, and asking the Regatta Committee to pay these bills. As it would be necessary to have this work done in any case, the Committee decided to accede to their request. In future Mr. T. J. Foran will be recognized as the official publisher of a Regatta Programme. Owing to the fact that much objection has been raised re the decision handed down by the Committee last week that in charging tent holders a fee of five dollars, and same to be used for cleaning up purposes, has been abolished. A letter received from Sir Edgar Bowring, was read, stating his disapproval of it. After much discussion the Committee decided to rescind the resolution. At the same time the matter of cleaning up the grounds will be given due consideration. The following Judges were appointed:—Hon. J. R. Bennett, J. P. Croft, E. J. Brophy, C. F. Taylor, Capt. E. Engle, W. H. Rennie, Councillor V. L. Combe and W. J. Martin. In addition to the Judges appointed above, other members of the Committee will take turns in the boats, and in the Judges' cab to the buoys during the various races. An application from the Newfoundland Govt. Railway, was rescinded. The following rules were submitted by Vice-President Higgins, and passed unanimously:—

Bankers' Race—Those only shall be eligible to row in this race, who are employed in Newfoundland and in the Banks which they represent. Each crew must consist of employees of the one bank.
Senior Football Race—Those only shall be eligible to row in this race, who are playing members of the present season in League Championship games, for the Clubs which they represent. Each crew must consist of players of the one club.
Championship Race—The crew making the quickest winning time on Regatta Day for any boat shall have the right to compete in this race in such boat.

Feildians Defeat C.E.I.
Last night's football game between the Feildians and C.E.I. was attended by many supporters of both clubs, and in a fair exhibition of football saw the Institute lads go down to defeat by the close score of three goals to two.
