The first General Conference of the united Methodist bodies in the Dominion of Canada met for business in the Metropolitan Wesleyan Church, Toronto, on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. This new Conference is, by its provisional constitution, at present limited to 220 members, comprising an equal number of ministers and lay men. These delegates have already been elected by ballo—the ministerial by ministers at their late Annual Conferences, and the lay by lay men at their recent District Meetings. They represent a wide field of occupancy coming, as we find them, from Ontario, Quebec, British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Cape Berton, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland.

The proportion of representatives in the General Conference is at the rate of one minister and one layman for every eight ordained ministers in the several bodies now amalgamated.

On motion, the Hon. Mr. Wilmot, extovernor of New Brunswick, was unanimously chosen chairman pro tem; and the Rev. Alexander Sutherland and Mr. Benjamin Hopkins were appointed Secretaries pro tem.

At 2 o'clock the Convention re-assembled, when, on motion, it was agreed that the Conference should proceed to cleet by bullot, and without debate, a President for the ensuing four years. The result of the vote gave Dr. Ryerson 89, Dr. 1. ee 64, and the balance in scattered votes, The venerable Chief-Superintendent of Education, who was declared duty elected, was introduced to the chair by Hon. Mr. Willmot, who retired from 1's temporary honors with the utterance of a few graceful compliments on the choice of the Assembly.

The President asked Conference to cleet its Secretary, who might be either a minister or a layman, and the Rev. D. D. Currie, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., was elected.

On nomination, the Revs. Wm. Scott and Benja. Hopkins we. elected Assistant Secretaries, and the Rev. John Bred Journal Secretary.

After a short senson of deve on, the President briefly t 'dressed 3's brethren. A Comr ttee was then appointed to prepare, and submit for adoption on the morrow, a draft of rules and reg: 'ations for the guidance of Conference in its delactes and modes of procedure.

The Conference adjourned 1 Thursdry morning at 9.
