LONDON AND ENVIRONS.
—Miss Nina Phillips, of Rochester, N. Y., is visiting her aunt, Mrs. Howden, of this city.
—Mr. John Carlin, of Ingersoll, who has been visiting relatives in the city, returned home yesterday.
—Alderman W. W. Fitzgerald, of this city, is attending the Orange Grand Lodge, of B. N. A., at St. John, N. B.
—Miss Mary Black, of Central avenue, left on a six weeks' visit to her brother, Mr. Isaac Black, of Sarnia, and other friends up the lake.
—Mrs. Charles F. Potter has returned from her visit with friends in London. Her sister, Miss Rose, accompanied her home.—[Port Huron Times.
—Mrs. J. P. O'Byrne and Miss Edie have gone to Toronto to spend a couple of weeks with the former's brother-in-law, Mr. R. O'Byrne, of the Public Works Department.
—Capt. R. Dillon (the efficient rifle instructor with the Seventh Battalion when in the Northwest) was prostrated by heat in New York a short time ago, but is recovering at his home in Ottawa.
—Thomas Jackson, charged with obstructing the sidewalk, did not appear at the Police Court this morning, but his wife explained his absence. The charge was withdrawn.
—Mr. McGregor, of London, superintendent of St. Andrew's Sunday School, attended St. Andrew's school here on Sunday. He speaks highly of the enthusiasm and order of the Sunday school.—[Windsor Record.
—Sir Fred Middleton says that the Dominion Government generally ignored his recommendations to confer special honors on those who aided him to put down the rebellion. Among other advancements which he recommended was that of Captain Peters, of the Seventh, to be major.
—During the course of the dinner on Tuesday the 7th Fusiliers (London) played a number of selections outside the Kerby

House door, the rendering of "Little Annie Rooney," a vocal and instrumental combination, being particularly enjoyed. After concluding this concert the band drove down to his fair grounds in an open street car, playing all the way down.—[Brandon Telegram.

—Yesterday afternoon and evening a very enjoyable social was held at the residence of Mr. H. Mathewson, Queen's avenue, by the young people of the First Congregational Church. The afternoon was occupied by the Ladies' Aid Society in laying out plans for the winter's work. In the evening about 100 friends of the church gathered on the lawn in front of the house and spent a very pleasant time with songs and recitations.

—The pleasant afternoon drew a large crowd, principally ladies, to Victoria Park yesterday to hear the concert by the band of "P" Company, I. S. C. The programme consisted of popular selections, and the audience evidently enjoyed the specialties which are generally introduced in these concerts by way of variety. The "Horn Convention" was something novel and particularly well rendered, the vocal crowing interjections reflecting great credit on the imitative powers of the performers.

—Geo. Mundy and Edward Gorman com-
plied with a request to appear at the Police Court this morning, and answer a charge of fighting and being disorderly on Aug. 12. Both of them were sworn. Mundy deposed that Gorman was sitting in front of Brown's Hotel on King street, singing and otherwise disturbing the peace. He was trying to pull him inside the door, when the police-
man came along. Gorman admitted he had paraded of five or six glasses of ale and was singing Salvation Army songs on the strength of it. He did not remember anything of the tussle. The Magistrate dis-
charged them.

Failed Tea Match.
Lena Jacobs, a married woman living on Colborne street, attended the Police Court this morning in answer to a summons issued by her neighbor, Mary Gench, and charged her with using abusive language. The complaint was put in the box and repeated the offensive words for the delectation of the court. A couple of neighbors were also sworn and corroborated Mrs. Gench's as-
sertions. Mrs. Jacobs vehemently denied using such language and launched forth into a lengthy detail of the grievances to which she and her child had been subjected at the hands of the complainant. The Magistrate considered that she had had too much to say and accordingly fined her \$2.

Their First Picnic.
The first annual picnic of the National Union of this city was held on the Griffiths property, near Woodland, yesterday, a large representation of the membership being present. The most amusing feature of the day was the baseball match. One side was captained by Mr. B. McDonald, and the other by Mr. W. L. Graham.
